The Queen City Yacht Club proposes to Erect a Handsome New Structure.

FROM ALL PARTS OF CANADA.

Major M. Baillie has been appointed Chief of Police of Kingston. Lord Strathcona has given \$100 to the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition.

The policyholders of the Canada Life are not making much progress in Montreal in their fight against the directors.

Dr. Good, writing from Dawson to a Winnipeg paper, says there will be as much gold taken out of the Klondike this year as last.

Winnipeg ratepayers will vote on Thursday on a by-law to raise \$20,000 for the establishment of a civic electric lighting plant.

A story from the Yukon tells of the finding of two dead bodies in a tent on the Upper Stewart River. One was clutching a bag of gold. There was no clue to their identity.

Zoltan Van Rajes, an Hungarian, now at Ottawa, says he has concluded arrangements with the Interior Department, by which 500 or 600 families of Hungarians will be brought out this year.

The annual C. M. convention for Manitoba will be held at Brandon on May 6, 7, 8 and 9. Dr. Clark of Boston, founder of the C. M. movement, will be the leading speaker.

The movement to form a new club in Montreal has taken definite shape, and application has been made at Quebec for incorporation under the name of the Mount Royal Club, with a capital of \$100,000.

Winnipeg butchers have advanced prices of nearly all staple lines of meats. The advance will vary from 1c to 1 1/2c per pound on beef, veal and mutton, and is caused by the high price prevailing for cattle.

Isaac Jones, who has arrived at Victoria, B. C., from Alaska on the steamer Anhur, says that not more than 50 cents per pan was taken from any creek in the McQuestin and Stewart River districts this winter, because of water.

During the past year the Department of the Secretary of State issued 32 passports to Canadians journeying to foreign lands where such documents are required. Of this number 13 were for Chinese, who were naturalized British subjects.

Carrie Robert, 21 years old, and probably the smallest woman in Ontario, is dead at the home of her brother-in-law, Henry Belleprache, of Elmstead, Ont. She stood only 2 1/2 feet in her stockings. When a baby she fell from her high chair and broke her back.

Hamilton Board of Trade has decided to co-operate with the Ottawa Board of Trade in its proposal to have a conference with a view of encouraging a national system of technical education, and Mr. Wm. Marshall was appointed to represent the Hamilton Board.

The McIntee inquest was concluded at Hurford on Monday night. The autopsy revealed no cause of death, and Prof. Ellis deposed that he found no poison in the viscera. The finding of the jury was that Thos. McIntee came to his death on Feb. 1 by some cause unknown to them.

The Church of St. Peter's, of Hamilton, at the vestry meeting Monday night, passed a resolution of confidence in Rev. Thomas Georgehan, who was suspended by Bishop Du Moulin, after conviction, by a church court, for immorality. Only four men opposed the motion, and the ladies supported it.

FLASHED UNDER THE SEA.

PEACE PARTY OF REDS.

A Deputation Going to Ottawa to Uphold the Existing Law. The usual large crowd packed the Empire Theater twice yesterday, smoked to their hearts' content, and were highly pleased with the vaudeville performers and the closing skill. Some clever specialties are introduced.

AT THE THEATERS.

The play, "A French Maid," which opened at the Grand last evening, is advertised as a "frisky English novelty in two acts." It is a combination of vaudeville and light opera, and is graceful and piquant, farcical and humorous. The songs are choice, and well rendered, and the ballets extravagant and beautiful.

Anna Held takes the leading role, and as Suzanne may be described as such a character as first Henri's fiancée, of whom he wrote "she was one of those women who do mischief in the most virtuous and touching manner." This is a peculiarity of French gristles. The audience last evening were wonderfully partial to French gristles, and encored Miss Held until she "thanked six gentlemen," but refused to sing any more.

There was no particular plot in the play; merely plot enough to thread the specialties together. One of the most amusing features was a cakewalk performed by five little darkies in native African costume. They were attired somewhat a la Gunga Din; "The uniform 'e wore was nothing much before, an' rather less than 'arf o' that 'e had."

The chaps looked like little brownies, and stood out in ludicrous contrast in the presence of the buxom Anna Held.

Mr. Charles A. Bigelow, as a walter, and Mr. Hallin Molyneux, as Jack Brown, a sailor, do not need an introduction to a Toronto audience, as they are recognized artists. The cast of characters is well sustained throughout, and the performance last evening did not drag in any part.

The entertainment is so rich in specialties and the minor roles so well sustained that Anna Held herself is partially lost and obscured by the genius of her support.

THE TORONTO.

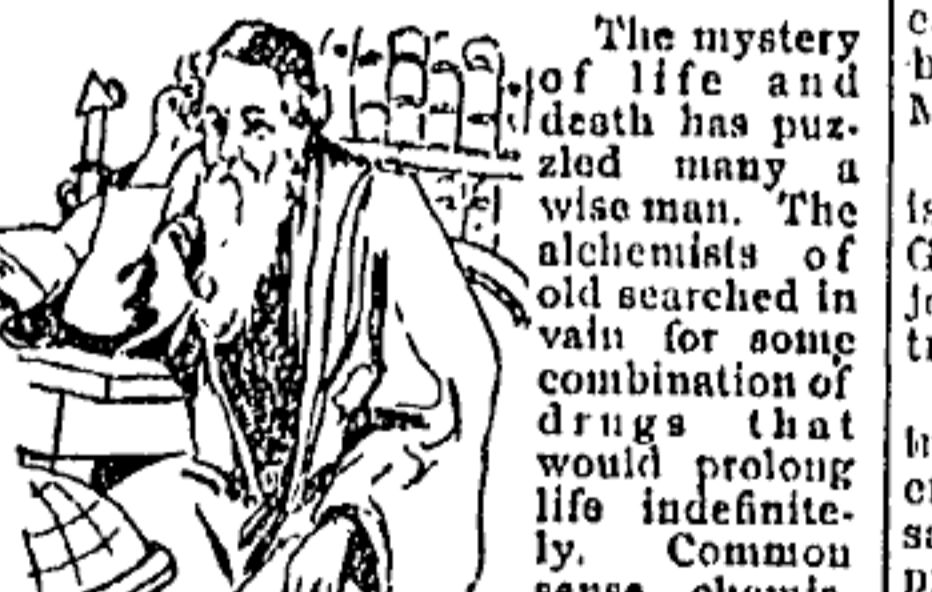
