

ORILLIA SECURES THE MACHINERY

Town Ordered by the Court to Put Up a Bond for \$9,000.

WRITS ISSUED TO-DAY

Order Made for Examination of Jacob Samuel in London, England.

The town of Orillia has had an exciting time with the construction of its electric and power plant at Severn Bridge. The contract was awarded to the Electrical Maintenance and Construction Company, of which P. H. Patriche was the representative. This company had \$6,500 worth of machinery delivered at the Severn by the Jencks Machine Company, of Sherbrooke, Quebec. The contractors were unable to go on, and the town took the entire matter in charge. The Jencks Company took possession of the machinery and shipped on the Grand Trunk, but were stopped at Lindsay by a receiver order obtained by the town. To-day the Master-in-Chambers at Osgoode Hall made an order declaring the defendants to be the Jencks Company, and striking out the Grand Trunk and handing the machinery back to the town on the depositing of a bond of \$9,000.

Dentist Risk Gets Costs.
Mr. Justice Ferguson to-day granted an order appointing Charles A. Risk, dentist, one street, receiver of \$550 of a \$2,500 legacy left to William D. Hutchison by his father, who died recently at Hitchmound Hill. Hutchison was a partner in the Meteor Cycle Company, of Chicago, who sued Risk unsuccessfully and owed him a big bill of costs, of which \$550 is the balance.

Two Writs Issued To-day.
Cameron & Lee issued two writs to-day. J. L. Rowdwell claims \$1,500 for commission he says he earned selling stoves for the Wrought Iron Range Company. He wants to be paid. Daniel Doherty, of Brampton, was left \$3,000 by his father, which sum he was to get from a farm bequeathed to his brother Bernard. Daniel says Bernard hasn't paid us; hence this law suit.

Will Be Examined.
An order was made to-day by the Master-in-Chambers for the examination in London, England, of Jacob Samuel, of Samuel, Benjamin & Company, in connection with two actions on notes held by the Molson's Bank against the estate of the late A. D. Benjamin.

Mrs. Marshall Loses.
Mr. Justice Rose has given judgment dismissing the action for damages brought by Mrs. Mary Jane Marshall against the City and the Industrial Exhibition Association. Mrs. Marshall claimed to have been injured in consequence of her foot going through the platform adjoining the Dairy building, in the Exhibition grounds.

Saturday Night Libel Case.
The Mayor Macdonald-Saturday Night libel case came up before the Master-in-Chambers to-day, when Lawyer Bradford, for the plaintiff, asked for an order to further examine Mr. E. E. Sheppard, and also an order to examine Mr. Joe T. Clark, said to be an ex-officer of the paper.

TOPICS FOR TRUSTEES.
Superannuation and Medals from Other Bodies Will Cause Discussions in School Board.

The proposal of the Public School Management Committee to revoke the board's oft-repeated decision not to accept medals from outside bodies, and to yield to the insistence of the Canadian Temperance League, will cause a warm debate at the board meeting to-morrow night.

Another warm debate will occur on the report recommending the establishment of a permanent superannuation fund, to which the board would contribute, during the first five years, one half the difference between the salary of any teacher retiring and the newly appointed teacher to fill the vacancy. After the first five years the board would contribute to the permanent fund, annually, an amount equal to one per cent of the total salary of the teachers for each year. The teachers would contribute in proportion to their salaries and length of service.

Opinion is divided among the trustees.

GAS CO. WILL BUILD.

The Consumers' Gas Co. has taken out a permit to build a one-story brick storage house on Front street, near Parliament, to cost \$4,500, and a \$7,000 coke house in the same locality.

CANOE CLUB'S PURCHASE.

The Toronto Canoe Club has purchased all of the premises between Lake street and their club house. This includes the property of the Queen City Yacht Club, and a number of other boat houses. These will be renovated by the Canoe Club.

TO TEST THE LIGHTS.

The Mayor held a conference with Professor Roseborough, of the School of Practical Science, and Mr. R. J. Parks, electrical engineer, this morning, with regard to testing the lights which tenderers for street lighting will submit for experiments. The tests will be made at the School of Practical Science.

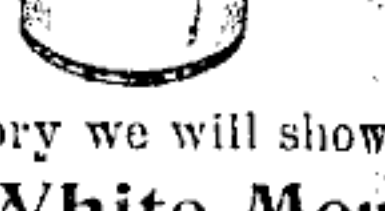

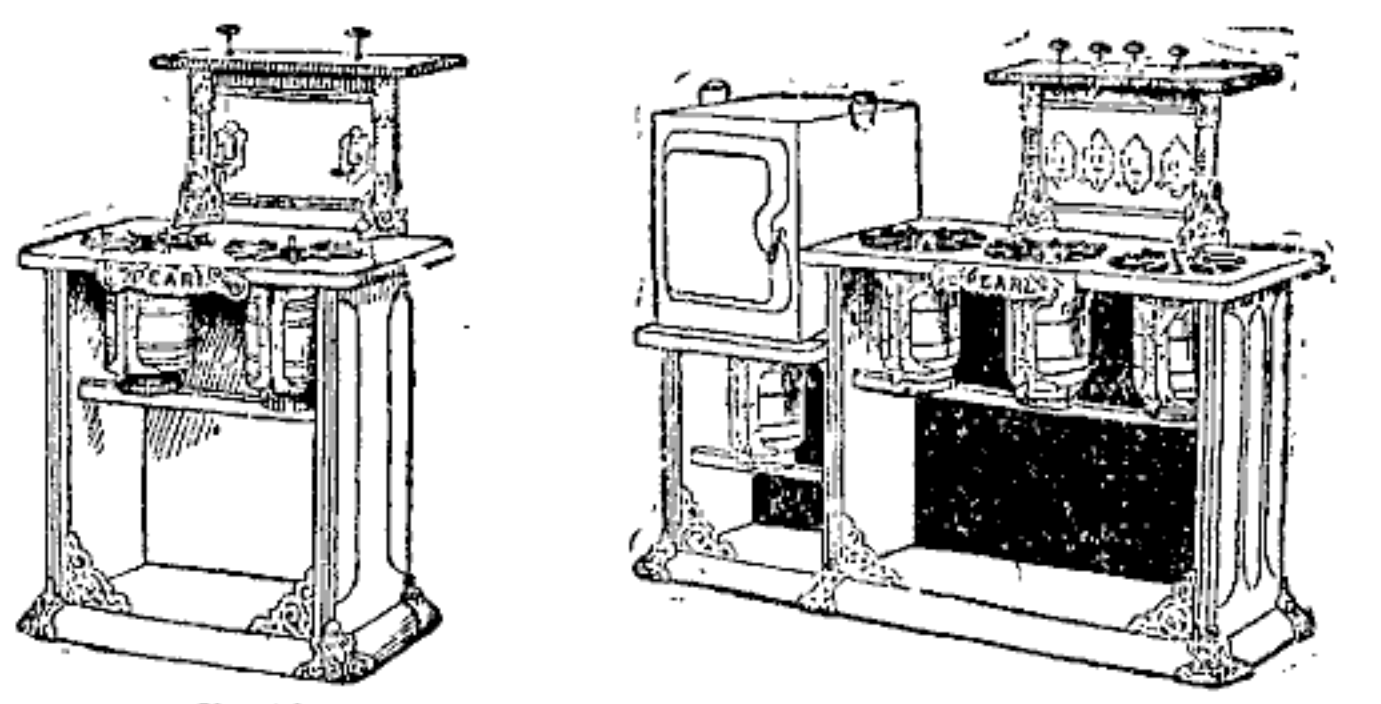
