

TORONTO TWELVE AS THE CHAMPIONS Cornwall Captain Says, in Condition, They Can Land the Flag. EASY WIN AT ROSEDALE Locals Outplayed the Cornwall Team in the First Home Game of Season.

MAIDEN RACE ON HAMILTON TRACK Sidney Lucas, American Derby Winner, Won His First Start There. JOCKEY MINUS WEIGHT Judge Nelson Disqualified Zanone and Paced Alice Farley First.
