TAYLOR WITH MONTREAL

Ex-Toronto Captain Signed to Play Second for the Easterners.

Taylor will strengthen the team immensely.

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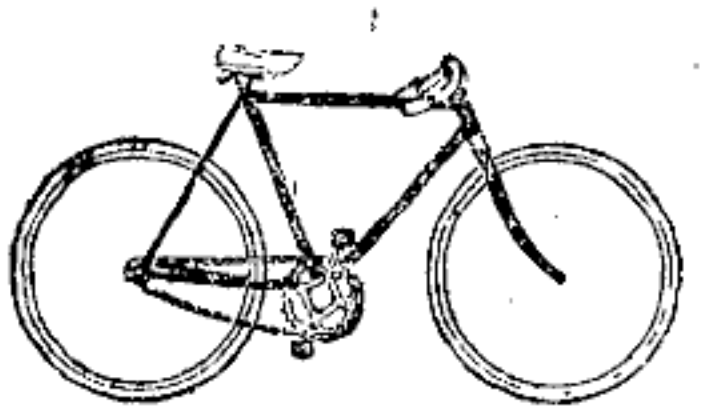
