

TORONTO BEATEN IN A GREAT GAME

Capitals Won a Most Scientific Match by 3 Goals to 1.

TECUMSEHS BLANKED

Orangeville Dufferins Capture the C. L. A. Senior Championship.

(Special to The Toronto Star.)

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—The Capitals, prospective champions of Canada, defeated the Queen City representatives on Saturday by 3 goals to 1. The game was unquestionably the best exhibition of Canada's national game seen here in the last two years.

The defence work of the Toronto Capitals was certainly the best seen here since the days of Quinn, Patterson, Devine, Carson and others of that famous Capital defence.

Best Defense in the League.

The most enthusiastic supporters of the Capitals admitted that the Queen City's defence demonstrated on Saturday that they were unquestionably the peers of any defence in the big league.

Toronto's Weak Spot.

The Toronto home was their weak spot. They evinced considerable nervousness and showed lack of condition. They did remarkably well to score one goal, especially as they had never played together before.

For the Capitals, Doherty, Ralph, and Gimes on the defence played the best game, while the two Murphys were conspicuous on the home.

The match throughout was entirely free from any deliberate roughness, and the players evinced the best of good will towards each other.

After supper the Capitals entertained the Toronto at the Grand Opera House, and after the performance both teams went down to the station in cabs provided by the Executive of the locals. At the station hearty cheers were given by the teams for each other. The Capital executive, as a further evidence of their good feeling, put a large hamper of good things on the train for the refreshment of the Toronto's inner man. Such treatment as this to visiting teams will no doubt raise the standard of the game, and will make the players forget any grievances that may have arisen during the match.

MARTIMAS WON THE FEATURE RACE

Mr. Seagram Also Turned Out a Winner on Saratoga's Last Day.

FUTURITY FOR WHITNEY

Mr. Wm. Hendrie and his party from Hamilton were much disappointed on Wednesday last when Martimas was beaten in the big handicap at Saratoga, but on Saturday they had a chance to rejoice, as the Cantlemas colt won the feature race on the program on get-away day at Saratoga.
