INVADER WON TWO CUPS AT HAMILTON

Sibbick Designed Boat Victorious in Her First Race—The Canadian a Great Disappointment—Whitecap of the Q.C.Y.C. Captured the Walker Cup.

Hamilton yacht clubs had any other cups, trophies, etc., of any kind in their possession yesterday they were wise enough to keep them in the safety vaults. Toronto sailors and Toronto craft carried off every trophy they placed within reach. Here is how the records look: Queen's Cup, for 30 and 35-footers—Invader. Walker Cup, for 35 and 40-footers—Invader. F. E. Walker Cup, for 16-foot skiffs—Whitecap.
