EVEN BREAK IN THE ROCHESTER GAMES

"Pop" Williams Responsible for the Victory on Saturday.

Rochester, July 27.—Toronto defeated Rochester here to-day by 4 to 1 in a splendid contest. "Pop" Williams should be given the credit for winning the game, for he certainly put up a superior article of ball, holding the local team down to five hits, and having perfect control at critical stages. The team back of him played an errorless game, and that helped to hold the Bronchos in check.

Brown pitched a good game, but was a little off in the sixth inning, hitting Schaub with the ball when the bases were full, forcing in a run. Conn replaced him in the last half of the 8th inning.
