WILL CROWD OUT RACING MACHINES

New Yachting Rules to be Adopted by L. Y. R. A. at Next Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Lake Yacht Racing Association, the governing body of Lake Ontario, which was to have been held in Hamilton this afternoon, has been postponed indefinitely.

The L.Y.R.A. has declared in favor of a new classification of boats for racing purposes, which will kill out the racing machine, which has crept in in spite of the present measurement, though, at the time the latter was formulated, it was considered that it would effectually do away with these flimsy accommodationless craft.

The L.Y.R.A. will follow the lead of the L.Y.R.U. As soon as the latter evolves rules which will prevent the construction of the racing machine, the L.Y.R.A. will adopt their measurements and formulae of classification.

The special committee of the L.Y.R.U. having the matter in charge has not yet completed its work, and until it does the L.Y.R.A. will not meet.

The special committee which was appointed by the Union to bring in a new rule consists of Mr. Aemilius Jarvis of Toronto, representing Lake Ontario; Commodore Warner of Chicago, representing Lake Michigan; Mr. Radner of Cleveland, representing Lake Erie.

The committee is now considering, and it is likely that it will recommend the formula in use in Great Britain and by the London and Boston Yacht Racing Associations. The following are the dimensions restricted under this formula:

- 1. Maximum L.O.L.
2. Maximum L.W.L.
3. Maximum beam.
4. Minimum beam.
5. Maximum draft.
6. Minimum draft of centerboards, board up.
7. Minimum head room over percentage of the L.W.L.
8. Minimum width on cabin floor over percentage of extreme length.
9. Maximum height of cabin trunk.
10. Minimum freeboard.
11. Maximum sail area.
12. Minimum area of immersed portion of greatest cross section.
13. Minimum amount of ballast.

The committee will, after consultation with expert designers, fill out the measurements for each class in such a way that good substantial craft will be assured all round.

The rule works to perfection in England, where there are but few centerboard boats. In Boston waters and Long Island Sound centerboard and keel boats race together under such measurement, and win time about.

The centerboard boat was always the craft which beat the present measurement, which is simply L.W.L. plus beam, plus 75 per cent. of the girth, plus 5 per cent. of the square root of the sail area, divided by two.

Genesee was a centerboard boat. She beat the measurement, and she also beat Beaver.

—Harold H. Paced an exhibition mile at Wingham yesterday in 2:14 1/2 on a slow track. Edelman and Margaret won the two races on the card.

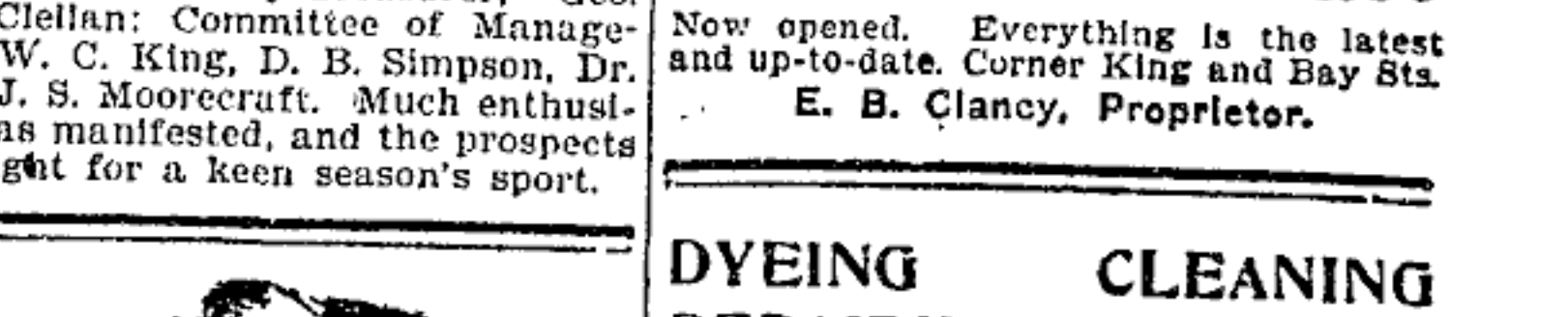
