## BUFFALO BEATEN IN THE FINAL GAME

Toronto Players Switched Around, Downey Going to the Bench.

### BRUCE PLAYING OUTFIELD

Captain. Bannon at Third Base and Lew Carr Moved to Short in Yesterday's Game.

Toronto won a slugfest match from Buffalo at Diamond Park yesterday by 9 to 5, thus taking the last game of the series from the league leaders. The locals presented a changed line-up, Downey being laid off, Carr playing shortstop, Capt. Bannon third base, White left field, and Bruce right field. The team played much better ball, and Bruce added the required batting strength.

Jack Low, the Buffalo first baseman, had to retire at the end of the second inning, being accidentally spiked by Toft. The Toronto catcher tripped over Law's foot, which was on the wrong side of the bag, and turned a couple of somersaults. Atherton, who was out of the game with a cold, took his place.

"Rube" Yeager pitched a fairly good game, although the Bisons got 13 hits, 5 of them for extra bases. Milligan made a home run over the right field fence, the first of the season. LeRoy, Buffalo's Indian pitcher, was easy for Toronto, as was Ferry, who succeeded him.

Buffalo started the scoring in the second, when doubles by Lynch and Milligan, and three successive bases on balls, forcing one man to cross the plate, gave the visitors two runs. In the fifth Milligan's home run added another. One came in the sixth on Connaughton's single, a passed ball, and a single by Brain, Ferry hit for three bases in the eighth and scored on Gettman's out to Massey. Yeager had curves to burn, and struck out men at critical stages.

Miller opened the first with a double but three flies to the outfield ended the inning. In the third Toronto gathered in two runs. Miller got a scratch single and went to second on Brain's bad throw. Bannon sacrificed, White singled, and Bruce got a pass. Carr's double scored the runs. A single by Bruce, Le Roy's balk, a sacrifice, and Connaughton's awful muff of Toft's fly scored Bruce in the fifth. Bannon's double, White's triple, and the sixth, Hargrove's triple and a base on balls to Toft, followed by Bannon's three-bagger, brought in a brace in the seventh. HOW THE REVENUE GROWS.

COOK'S ORONTAS WON LIVERPOOL

Hendrie's Martimas Was Second and Seagram's Cobourg Third.

RIDER LEFT AT POST TWICE

Jockey Wainwright Killed Two Horses' Chances at the Woodbine Yesterday.

By winning the Liverpool Cup at Woodbine yesterday with Orontas, Mr. G. W. Cook of Morrisburg practically annexed the championship of Canada. This race was for horses owned in Canada, and three owners sent their best horses to the post. Mr. Seagram's Gold Cure struck himself the other day in his race with Red Robe, so Cobourg, the wonderful sprinter, was the dependence of the Waterloo stable. Mr. Hendrie started Martimas, the Futurity winner, who has not done very well for the last couple of years because of sore feet, but who appears to be regaining his two-year-old form, when he was the best colt in America. The distance was 1-16 miles, and was run to suit Orontas. Danigman could not hold Cobourg in restraint the first part, and was 12 lengths in front at the three-quarters, where he started to back up. Walker on Martimas held back midway between the other pair. Blake, by long odds the best rider in the race, brought Orontas up to Martimas at the upper turn, and they raced together into the stretch, passing Cobourg on the way. Martimas stayed with Orontas until the last 16th, when the Cook horse pulled away and won handily by two lengths. Cobourg was six lengths behind Martimas.

After the race Mrs. Cook was presented with the cup by President Hendrie, and everybody drank the health of Mr. and Mrs. Cook, Trainer Gates, and the victorious Orontas.

Jack McGinn, the favorite, had a hard time getting up in the first race, and violent nearly landed the money at long odds. Ghetto made a fine finish, beating The Ebe a head for 3rd mofey. Blake's splendid jockeyship won the 2-year-old race for M.D.A. He nursed her very carefully, and had enough left to stall off Hallowcination and Wild Wave. Healing Salve made a strong finish.

Nat Rag, superior riding gave Sallie the victory in the steeplechase. Meagher might have done better with Inspector Stephen, as he was undoubtedly the best horse in the race. Livonian was an easy third, and pulled up very lame and sore.

Grand Marais, heavily played, was left flat-footed at the post in the 5th race and finished a good 4th. The winner turned up in Mr. Dymont's La Gazelle, a 30 to 1 shot, who outgamed Plum Tunt in the stretch, and won by a length. Ed Hyland's Artificial, an added entry, was third.

Nuptial was an easy winner of the 6th race for maidens. Two long shots, Joe Brown and Prince John, set the pace, the former holding on long enough to get the place by a good margin from the favorite. W. W. Dempster. The last event went to Heavysay, ridden by a stable boy. Wainwright on Alea was caught napping again, and was practically left at the post.
