# GREAT VICTORY IN 10TH INNINGS

Toronto Defeated Worcester in a Desperately-Played Contest.

**BRUCE'S HIT WON THE GAME**  
Massey Tied the Score, Reaching the Home Plate From Second on An Infield Out.

Toronto won the second game of the series from Worcester at Diamond Park yesterday afternoon by 6 runs to 5 in one of the most desperately-played contests of the season. The finish was highly sensational, an extra inning being necessary to determine the winner. The crowd went frantic when the winning run was scored, and Louis Bruce, who was a big factor in the other play, was carried around the field by a mob of hilarious and enthusiastic fans.

It was another heart's disease ending, and the shock nearly put the loyal rooters out of business. The championship hung in the balance for some minutes, and the suspense was something awful. When a victory was pulled out of what looked like certain defeat nothing could restrain the outburst of enthusiasm and joy.

The giant Falkenburg, who hands the ball up to the catcher, pitched for Worcester, and he tried his utmost to win the \$100 bonus from the Buffalo manager. He had the Torontos completely at sea after the fourth innings, although men got to base on errors and his wildness. Wolfe, the Toronto south-paw, was effective, too. Delehanty was the only man to find his delivery safely, while Frisbee worked him for three passes to first. Delehanty made three singles and a two-bagger, and all were opportune.

Toronto started out like easy winners. Worcester got a run in the first innings on Frisbee's base on balls, Wolfe's wild throw to Massey to catch him napping, and Delehanty's single. Toronto evened up in their half. After two men were out Bannon singled, and reached second and third on wild pitches, which Steelman stopped, but could not handle cleanly. Massey drew a base on balls, and stole second. Steelman snapped the ball to Falkenburg, who shot it second before anybody got there. Bannon scored on the play.

In the second Toronto got three more. Weidensaul started off with a two-bagger, Carr popped up a fly to Wrigley, and Toft was thrown out at first. Wolfe and Downey drew bases on balls, and all three scored on White's corking single, which got away from Frisbee. White tried to make third on the error, and was put out.

The score stood 4 to 1 until the sixth, with the visitors going out in order, and the Torontos getting men on bases, but unable to get them around. In the seventh Frisbee beat out a slow grounder to short. Downey fumbled Clancy's bounding ball, and the Worcester man was safe. Massey made a great play on Van Zandt's drive down the foul line, getting the batter at first. Frisbee and Clancy scored on Delehanty's single, and the latter crossed the plate with the tying run on Rickert's safe drive. Rickert stole second and third, and Connaughton drew a base on balls, but Wrigley and Steelman were not equal to the occasion.

Toronto had a great chance to win out in their half of the ninth. Toft, the first man up, was walked to first, after some hot arguments between the Worcester players and Umpire Cox, reached second on a passed ball, and went to third on Wolfe's sacrifice. The best Downey could do was a grounder to pitcher. White drew a base on balls and walked down in second in order to draw a throw, but Steelman wouldn't take a chance. It was then up to Bannon, but his best was a grounder to shortstop.

The visitors went in for their tenth innings with an abundance of confidence. To start with, Clancy hit a beauty down the left field line for two bases. Merritt, who was put in to bat in place of Van Zandt, hit one down past second, on which Bannon made a fast play, getting the runner at first. Delehanty sent two balls down the rooters' backs with a two-base smash to left field, and Clancy crossed the plate. Rickert hit a fly to Jones, who held Delehanty at second. Wrigley hit safely to left field, and Delehanty tore for the plate. White's throw was perfect, and the runner was put out easily.

The situation was not very hopeful. Toronto needed a run to tie, and two to win. Bill Massey, the first man up, hit a slow grounder, which Connaughton fumbled momentarily, and Massey was safe at first. Jones, after trying to bunt, fouled out to Steelman.

Bill Hargrove, who was coaching, called the umpire's attention to the fact that the seam of the ball in play was ripped. The umpire decided that it was good enough to play with. Hargrove made a grab at the ball, and was ordered out of the grounds. The Toronto players protested, and grouped themselves around Mr. Cox and the pitcher.

"Make them play ball!" shouted Captain Wrigley, of Worcester. "They're playing for darkness."

Finally the field was cleared, and Weidensaul stepped up to the plate. The second ball pitched he fouled to Hargrove, who promptly threw the ball over the grand stand, and then ran after it.

Another ball was thrown out on the diamond. Pitcher Falkenburg picked it up and threw it over the stand. Umpire Cox went in to the bench and picked out a couple of balls himself to finish the game with.

Weidensaul drew a base on balls, and the crowd cheered and shouted as Massey walked down to second.

All eyes were on Carr. He let two

bad ones go by, and then smashed a hard one at shortstop. Connaughton fiddled it perfectly, and threw to Wrigley at second, putting Weidensaul out.

Meanwhile Massey, who had started from second when the ball was hit, dashed on towards the home plate. Wrigley shot the ball home. The throw was high, and Massey slid in over the plate in safety with the tying run before Steelman could put the ball on him.

Then ensued a scene of the wildest excitement. When the umpire declared Massey safe the Worcester players ran at him in a bunch. Wrigley was in the van, but Massey intervened, and threw the Worcester captain out of the way. In the confusion Carr reached second base.

The situation then was: Two men out, a man on second, and Toft at bat, with the Worcester players trying to delay the game. When order was restored Toft stepped out of the batters box, and Louis Bruce, the idol of the fans, took his place, amidst tumultuous cheers from the stands.

"One ball!" said the umpire, as Falkenburg shot one wide of the plate.

The next ball was on the outside corner, and Bruce drove it into a safe spot in left field. Rickert fielded it perfectly, and made a nice throw home, but Carr reached the plate with the winning run half a second before the ball.

Then the crowd swarmed out on the field, patting all the players on the back, and carried Bruce in triumph around the diamond. The score:
