ANOTHER STANLEY CUP GAME TO-NIGHT

The Winnipeg Vics and Montreal Were a Tie at 12 p.m. Saturday.

IRON DUKES' GOOD CHANCE

O.H.A. Representatives Think Their Senior Champions Can Win From Either Team.

COMMENT ON CURRENT SPORTING TOPICS

That was a unique ending to the Stanley Cup game at Montreal on Saturday night—a tie at midnight, and, therefore, no decisive result.

Montreal, with their accustomed liberality of spirit, claimed the cup, upon the expiration of the one hour's play, their contention being that the Winnipeg Victorias could not possibly win two out of three matches, as the conditions called for. The referee repudiated this unfair and unsportsmanlike contention, and ordered the teams to go out upon the ice and play the match to a finish, which meant, under the Quebec rules, until one side scored a goal.

The coming of the Sabbath saved the Montrealers. The Winnipeggers had them on the run, and if it had been any other day but a Saturday a sure defeat would have been registered against the cup-holders.

To-night the disposition of the trophy will be decided. If Montreal wins the cup will be theirs, but if the Winnipeggers win the unfinished game of Saturday will be played immediately upon the conclusion of the match, and the team that scores the first goal will secure the trophy.

This state of affairs will be sufficient to arouse tremendous excitement in Montreal and Winnipeg, while hereabouts there is great interest taken in the result owing to the challenge of the Wellingtons.

The O.R.F.U. executive has secured most of the football brains of the Province to apply on the new snap-back rule. And the committee has power to add to its number. Any authority that has been overlooked please hold up his hand.

Wellingtons intended playing their Stanley Cup team to-night, but at the invitation of their friends will play the regular O.H.A. team, leaving George Mackay to coach the Iron Dukes from the boards. This variety team will have some new faces, and it is expected the change will do them good.

Toronto baseball patrons won't complain at having to pay 50 cents more for admission to the grand stand if they are provided with the fast article of ball to which they are accustomed. It seems that Toronto was the only city on the Eastern League circuit where the 40-cent grand stand ticket prevailed, and managers of visiting clubs, when play on a percentage, objected most strenuously to the reduced charge here. Their efforts bore fruit at the annual meeting, and a uniform price of 50 cents will now prevail all around the circuit.

Queen's look to be sure champions of the newly-formed Interscholastic Hockey League. They have presented a handsome trophy for annual competition, to be known as "Queen's Cup." It will be "Queen's Cup" this year all right.

Miley Grogan, being unable to make money either as a bookmaker or as a better, has decided to run a Turf Information Bureau. He will now sell to the public information which in his other capacities kept him poor.

The Wellingtons have their eyes upon the Earl brothers, and one of two others of the speedy Marlboro hockey team. The Iron Duke think they are the most promising players in Toronto.

For two pins the Munson bowlers would have beaten their Buffalo brethren on the round. However, they lost by one.

The most remarkable score made in the O.H.A. during this or any other season was compiled by the Marlboros in their game with Niagara Falls at the Mutual street rink on Saturday, when they beat the visitors by a score of 20 goals to 5. As the game lasted 60 minutes, the local team scored a goal on an average of every 2 minutes of play. They outclassed their opponents in every particular, and surprised the hockey enthusiasts present by the excellence of their work, especially on the foreward line, which played together in the well-ordered machinery, displaying a combination that most senior teams might envy. The ridiculous ones with which they passed the visiting defence was a striking testimony to the system under which they played.

The St. Georges had a good laugh at the expense of their manager, "Teddy" Bonnell, at Peterboro on Saturday night. Mr. Bonnell was goal umpire behind the Peterboro net, and all through the first half endeavored to work up a conversation with Grough, the local goal-keeper. RAISED THE FEE FOR GRAND STAND

Eastern League Adopts a 50 Cent Tariff for All the Clubs.

SECRETARY SOOLE'S VIEWS

Toronto Club's Financial Man Speaks of the Probable Effect of the Change.

Last night President Jess Applegath of the Toronto Ball Club returned home from the Eastern League meeting in New York.

The only thing new Mr. Applegath had to report was the adoption of a rule making it compulsory to charge a grand stand admission fee of 50 cents in every city on the circuit.

Here in Toronto it has been 15 cents, making it 40 cents in all. Hereafter it will be 50 cents. In regard to this change The Star interviewed Secretary-Treasurer Thos. C. Soole of the local club to-day. He said:

"I have often wondered that some action in this direction was not taken before. This is the only city in the league where the grand stand admission is less than 25 cents, and it has always been a matter of complaint from managers visiting here that we should be allowed to charge only 15 cents for our grand stand, while they have always charged 25 cents. They will say, 'You have one of the best, if not the best, stands in the circuit, easy of access, and always patronized by a better class of people than any on the circuit; you have always had the best article of ball, and have always been near the top, if not on top, and yet you are granted the privilege over other cities in the league.'

"I do not think it will make much difference to our patrons or in six cases out of ten people in purchasing tickets would lay down 50 cents, and it kept our ticket sellers busy calling them back to get their 10 cents change. It may also have the effect of our selling more season books. These are made up of half-season, and contain 20 tickets, good for admission and grand stand, and sell for \$10, or 33 1/3 cents per ticket. They are handy also in avoiding the crush in purchasing tickets at the box office.

"We will still retain our two days for ladies, in which all the privileges will be free—likely Tuesday and Friday, and on all other days except Saturdays and holidays they will be given the privilege of the grounds free, but will have to secure a grand stand ticket.

"Our club also enjoys another privilege that no other club in the circuit has, and that is in regard to boys. We are given the privilege of admitting boys under 12 years for 15 cents, while in all other cities there is nothing less than 25 cents. The good effect of this can be seen from the number of boys enjoying this health-giving exercise on our vacant lots in the city, trying to emulate some of the many fine plays they have seen at some of the games they have attended.

"No, I do not think the baseball-loving public will mind the increase of 10 cents in the price of grand stand tickets."

Ed Barrow is in town again. He brought a bad cold back from Detroit. He says Detroit intends to hold Charlie Carr, despite Pat Powers' protest, and claims Carr was free to sign where he chose. He is quite willing, however, to pay a reasonable sum for Carr's release if Jersey City can show a legitimate claim upon him.

Jess Applegath says that Baltimore will surely succeed Montreal. Ted Munson has the grounds, and will buy the franchise on Thursday. Montreal's interests have been well protected by the Eastern League.

It hardly required Manager Stallings' assertion that Buffalo intended to stick with the Eastern League. Interviewed at Chicago, President Ben Johnson said: "There is no chance of the American League going into Buffalo. We left Buffalo once, and why should we go back? The Eastern League can have Buffalo so far as we are concerned, and we will go right along with our business in New York."

A meeting of the directors of the Toronto Ball Club will be held to-morrow night to consider the appointment of a manager to succeed Ed. G. Barrow, who has gone to Detroit. The mantle is expected to fall on Pitcher "Jimmy" Gardner but those in authority decline to commit themselves.

George Black of London is the latest applicant for the position. Mr. Black managed clubs in the Canadian League and in Michigan. He claims to have "brought out" these players: Tom Ir-

win Charles and Frank Hemphill, John Powell, Lew Oregier, Charles Cogswell, and Grimshaw.

Manager Barrow has signed A. B. Hopkins, a left-hand pitcher from the Chattanooga club of the Southern League. He is a big fellow, and played 60 games last season.

President Jess Applegath had a large baseball mall to open to-day. It included the application of Bill Hargrove and Joe Black of London for the manager-ship; the signed contract of Lewis G. Post, the new outfielder from the Michigan State League; an application from J. Siegrist, a Cleveland amateur to play third base; and a letter from "Jimmy" Gardner, stating that if appointed to the position he intended to manage the Toronto club from the bench.

Mr. Applegath states that President Powers hopes to get Ed Swartwood, Tim Hursb, Lynch, and another star umpire for his staff this year.

LOT ROE GOING TO MONTREAL.

Another Toronto Skater to Compete in the Championships.

Lot Roe, of the Wellesley Athletic Club, the two and five-mile Ontario skating champion, leaves for Montreal to skate in the American championship races to-morrow night. Roe is in good shape. He has been doing steady work at the Grand Central rink all winter, and in the distance events should make a showing.

Roe lacks experience. Rubbing up against the veterans of the knife blades at Montreal will do him a world of good, even if he does not lug home a championship or two. Roe is a good strong skater, and if he is not lusted or interfered with on the corners, will make the best of them more along a lively clip to beat him out. He can stand a grueling race, and always stays until the finish.

SCOTCH CURLER IN HOSPITAL.

Major Bertram Left Here Suffering From Blood-Poisoning.

The Scotch curlers left one of their number, Major Bertram, in Toronto when they entrained to-day for Winnipeg. The major is in the hospital, suffering from blood poisoning, which developed early last week in Hamilton, and which prevented him from going on the Western Ontario trip.

The enforced absence of the major was much regretted by his colleagues, especially as his illness is of a somewhat serious nature. This makes two of the party in hospitals in Canada. Mr. Smith being still down with a broken kneecap at Halifax.
