Toronto Junction, June 22.—The Senior Shamrocks of Toronto Junction are champions of the Senior City League for another year. The handsome oak and silver shield donated by N. Garland some years ago to the champions of the City League will, therefore, remain in Toronto Junction.

This is the result of Saturday's game on the Island oval, when the Young Tecumseh were vanquished by the Junction team by a score of 6 goals to 2. Properly speaking, the game, which was played as an exhibition game, for previous to its start about 6 o'clock the Tecumseh conceded the game to the Shamrocks, thus giving the latter team the championship. Then the Tecumseh put three senior men on their team and lined up against the green jerseys. The Shamrocks had much the better of the play, which was indicated by the score of 6 to 2. McWilliams, the crack home player for the Indians, tallied their two goals, and the Shamrock goals were scored by Pirie (3), Barker (2), and Kinsman (1). Robinson, in goal for the Tecumseh, was kept busy most of the time by the Shamrock home. Graydon and Mooney, on the Irishmen's defence, put up a strong game, and managed to hold their checks down pretty closely.

There were three teams in the Senior City League, but the Young Toronto, the third team, following an annual custom of theirs, dropped out of it after the schedule was arranged, and are now in Intermediate company. It will not be necessary, therefore, for any more matches to be played in this series.

Junction people are now talking of the stiff argument which the local team might be able to put up against the Senior Tecumseh. It must be borne in mind that Port Hope defeated the Shamrocks 7 to 3 some time ago, when three of the local team's best players were in the game, and on Saturday Port Hope did up the Tecumseh, 10 to 0. Therefore the Shamrocks stand more than a chance. As the Shamrocks have now won the shield two years in succession, they are entitled to keep it.

Won From Weston.

The Intermediate Shamrocks also did valiantly at Weston on Saturday, holding the Weston team down to a tie score of two goals each. Last year Weston defeated the green-jerseyed lads on the latter's own grounds 5 to 0, and the reversal comes as a pleasant surprise.
