MONCTON'S APPROVAL

City Council Adopts Resolution Endorsing Railway to That Point.

Moncton, N.B., July 16.—At a meeting of the City Council last night a resolution was unanimously adopted urging strongly upon the Government and Parliament of Canada the construction of a railway from Winnipeg to the shortest practicable line to Quebec City, and from thence to the city of Moncton, via the most feasible and direct route through the center of this Province, over which routes from Winnipeg to Moncton the Intercolonial should, for its through trains, have running rights in common with the operating railways and be it further resolved that in the opinion of this City Council the selection of the city of Moncton as the eastern terminus of this railroad from Winnipeg to Moncton assures the selection of a neutral diverging point common to all ports in the Maritime Provinces, without discriminating against any.
