GRAND STAND RECORDS.

The Fair officials and citizens generally are still talking about Monday's big records. Monday not only broke all records in attendance, but it now holds the honors in grand stand crowds.

Yesterday fell right in line with Monday and Tuesday as record breakers. Of course, the attendance did not get within striking distance of Monday's great record, but just the same it was far ahead of the corresponding day of last year.

A MIDWAY SHOW CLOSED.

In spite of the fact that the Midway shows are all going double the business of last year, all is not quiet along the Potomac of the showdown people.

Today, which holds seven concessions in the Midway, brought the show down to a close. He and the management of the Stadium, it is said, had a difference of opinion as to whether the show should be closed to-day.

THE BIGGEST WINNER.

The largest round-up was made by J. G. Robbins & Son in the short-horn contest. They walked off with eleven prizes, five of which are firsts, to say nothing of the junior championship for yearling cows, for which a silver medal and sweethearts were won.

VAN HORNE'S PRIZES.

In the short-horn class Sir William Van Horne is supposed to have done much better so far as glory is concerned, but not in the parade. Van Horne's point of view, Sir William carried off the grand championship for both cows and bulls, which means two silver medals and sweethearts.

\$300 FOR A SENATOR.

W. C. Edwards stands third in the short-horn class with \$300 in prizes, but no medals.

Interest in the Jersey cattle competition ran high, but Messrs. Bull & Sons closed up the bulk of the stock things. Their bank account is swelled to the extent of \$583 and three new silver medals grace the walls of their stable.

AMONG THE GALLOWAYS.

In the Galloway class the great fight was between Mr. W. G. W. MacCrae, of Guelph, and Mr. Robert Shaw, of Brantford. Mr. McCrae's winnings show the finest total. They are \$205, with the most mistakes for both cows and bulls.

THE CRIZIE AYRSHIRE.

The Ayrshire contest was a big one. The leaders here are Messrs. W. W. Ogilvie, Hunter, & Reford, Mr. W. W. Ogilvie gets away with \$193; Mr. Robert Reford, a Quebec man, gets \$12; Robert Hunter boasts the sweepstakes, and Mr. Reford the sweepstakes for bull of any age.

YACHT CLUB AT THE FAIR.

The official visit of the members of the Queen City Yacht Club to the Fair may not have netted Canada's National Exposition much money, but it produced an evening's solid enjoyment for the club.
