



AMENDMENT FOR \$200 FEE FOR C.L.A. SENIOR CLUBS

Proposal to Put the Management of the Series in the Control of the Executive Committee—Contest for the Presidency, H. S. Cameron of Beaverton a Candidate for the Office.

Secretary W. H. Hall of the C. L. A. today received several amendments proposed by the Executive Committee. The amendments, proposed by the first vice-president, Francis Nelson, for the regulation of the senior series.

Mr. Nelson proposes that all senior clubs shall be placed in control of the Executive Committee of the C. L. A. instead of the senior committee of management, and that a fee of \$200 be charged each club competing in the senior series.

There is likely to be a contest for the presidency of the C. L. A. after all at the convention in the Labor Temple on Good Friday. H. S. Cameron of Beaverton has been nominated, and it was stated today that it was altogether likely that he would allow his name to go to the convention.
