EMPIRE COAT IN EGG PLANT PURPLE



A noteworthy example of this is a coat of broadcloth in the egg plant shade of purple known as aubergine. The cloak might easily be the popular design of 1903 which was plaited over the shoulders and fell with fullness both back and front to below the knees. Bishop sleeves with turnback cuffs carry out the same idea. But the new article is a wide belt of braided velvet that crosses the back somewhat above the waistline, and, passing under the arm, slopes up to the bust line. It enters a slit at either side of the front and allows the coat to fall in princess line from the neck. What may be called the skirt of the wrap drops in gathers from beneath the velvet band and has open seams at each side faced back with satin to match. Reverse cuffs, and belt are of aubergine velvet, handsomely braided in black taffeta in raised designs. Cloth-covered buttons embrodered in black give a final smart touch to the coat.
