RUPTURE BETWEEN GREECE AND ROUMANIA

Roumanian Minister Leaves Athens—Greece Demands Compensation for Loss in Riots.

Bucharest, Roumania, Sept. 23.—The diplomatic rupture between Greece and Roumania has been completed by the departure of the Roumanian Minister from Athens. The interests of the Roumanians in Greece have been entrusted to Italy, while the Russian Legation here will guard the interests of the Greeks in Roumania.

NORWAY TO SECEDE WITHOUT A CONFLICT

Terms of Dissolution Were Agreed Upon To-day and Secretaries Draw Up Protocols.

Karlstad, Sweden, Sept. 23.—An agreement was reached this morning on the terms for the dissolution of the union of Norway and Sweden. The understanding was arrived at during the final session of the delegates, which lasted over three hours, and the meeting adjourned until 1.30 p.m.

SHALL TORONTO SEPARATE SEXES

Views of Educational Authorities on the Proposal to Abolish Co-Education in Certain of the Schools.

The total abolition of co-education in the schools under the direction of the Board of Education was not the purpose of Trustee Miss Clara Brett Martin's proposal when she moved that three Public schools and one High school be set aside for girls, and that three Public schools be reserved for boys. Miss Martin declares that she is in favor of co-education as a general thing, but she adds that there are certain cases in which it is inadvisable. What she wants is local option, as it were, in the matter.

THE DEVIL STRIP.

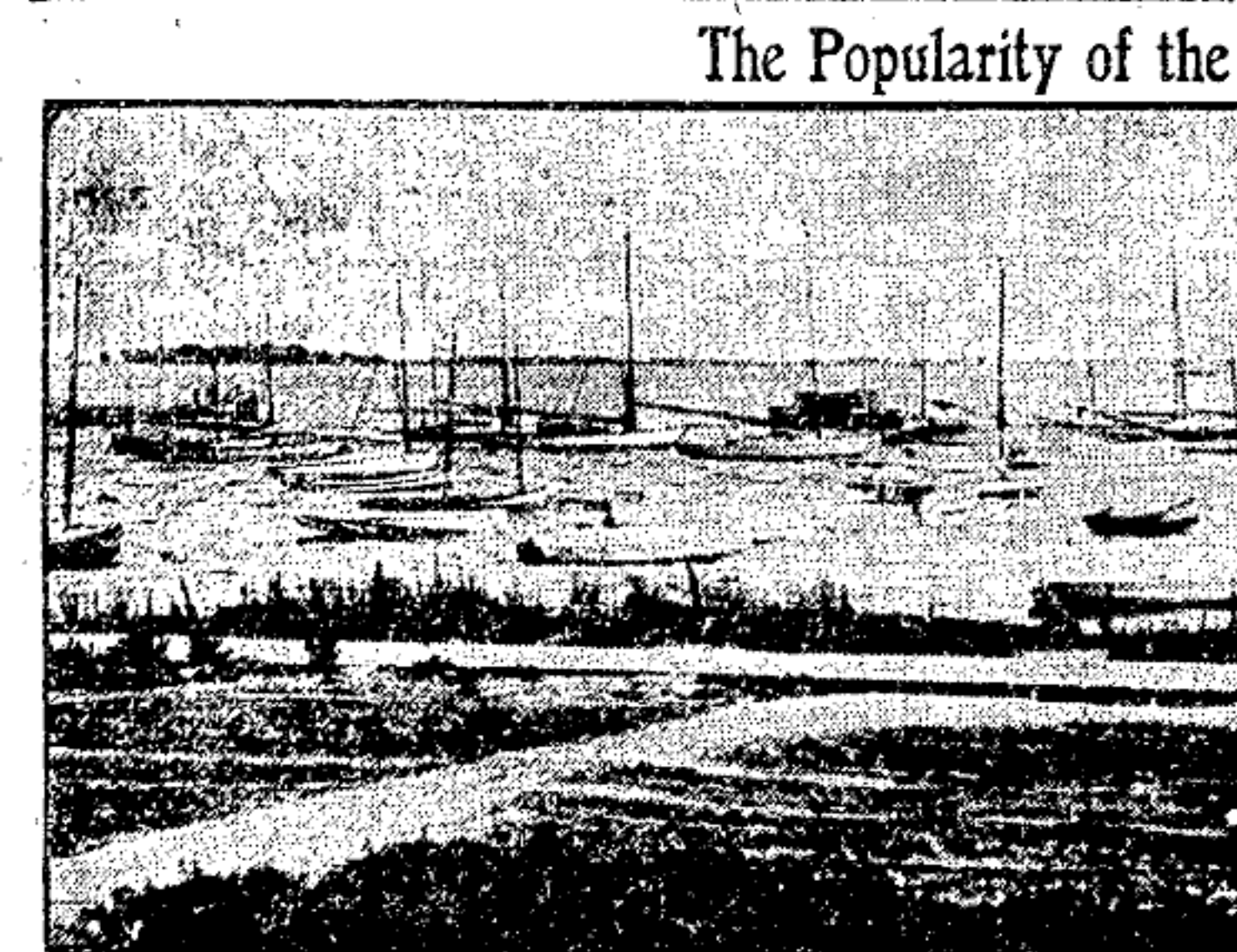
Narrower in Toronto Than in Cities Over the Line. Letters received by City Engineer Rust from several American cities show that the devil strip in Toronto is unusually narrow.
