

ASKED PUDDYS FOR CASH AND IT WAS FOR COMING

No Accounting of the Sums Given to Elliott and He Got Large Amounts Whenever He Sought It—Denies Improper Purposes.

In the civic bribery charges yesterday afternoon the examination of George Elliott was continued. "Did you ever say Mr. Ramsden did to get \$400 out of this matter?" "I don't remember. I don't think I did. I didn't, were three answers all in the same breath. "If there was no reason to say it, you would be able to say it was not true?" "I don't remember."

"What did you say to Hogue?" Mr. Drayton asked. "I just said anything that he asked me. I said yes or no to things I did not hear. I was anxious to get my letters," replied Elliott. "And then almost in the same breath he declared the letters were not valuable, and that he did not care to have them sent back or not. Then he said he could contradict Hogue or Hodgins in some of their statements in their affidavits, but would up by saying that he did not remember what he had said. He just told him anything. "What object did you have in misleading Hogue as to this matter?" asked Mr. Drayton.

The Name That Was Cut Out. Mr. Drayton showed Mr. Elliott a letter of commendation from the North-West Ratepayers' Association, which had been addressed to an alderman who had voted against the granting of the permit, from which the alderman's name had been cut out. "I can't tell." "Will you swear that your memory is such that you cannot tell where you got this circular from?" "Yes."

Elliott's Own Affairs. Cross-examined by Mr. Paterson, Elliott said that he had received the money from Puddy Bros. to influence aldermen and others who had influence with the city council. Mr. Paterson proceeded to delve into Elliott's history. Elliott acknowledged that he had given Ald. Graham a check for which there were no funds, and that that check was a judgment summons out for him.

He denied a newspaper interview positively, and then added, "Not that I know of."

Mr. Ramsden was working for us, but he was not paid, said Mr. Puddy. "He never made any report at all to us." "Have you seen any of the aldermen at all yourself?" "Yes, I have seen them all." "The court then adjourned to meet this morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Puddy will have to produce the notebooks which are kept in the memoranda of the money paid to Elliott and also the firm's cash-book."
