MR. SEAGRAM WINS THE CUP, INFERNO REPEATS VICTORY

Woodbine Race Track, May 29. This tenth day of the O.J.C. meeting found the weather conditions almost as bleak as usual, the sun doing the disappearing act with remarkable frequency. The air was cool, but the ladies took a chance, and there was quite a display of handsome gowns on the lawn. The bookmakers did business, as usual, in the ring, the Police Court prosecution merely being a text case.

The first two races witnessed the downfall of the favorite, Halbert and Andrew Summers. In the second race Jockey Dave Nicol showed his class by bringing Canine Maid home in front by a magnificent ride through the stretch, in which the Western crack rider showed up "Puddin'" McDaniel, the jockey of the Seagram stable.

The feature race of the day, the King Edward Hotel Cup, at a mile and a quarter, had only three starters—Inferno, held at the prohibitive odds of 9-2; Lotus Ester, at 2-1, and Tournene, at 7-1. The books offered 3-2 on the field against Inferno. Lotus Ester was 1-3 to be second, and Tournene even money for same place.

The King Edward Hotel Cup now becomes the property of Mr. Seagram, his having won it twice in succession, Inferno also being victorious last year.

McDaniel got his flying with one to the Step, and opened a gap of ten lengths at the bend, and it seemed as if the race was all over. Nicol kept working on his mount, which was slow to get her stride, and finished with a superb hand ride that made McDaniel look cheap, as Canine Maid ranged alongside the pacemaker in the last furlong. Canine Maid managed to get up in the last jump to win by a nose. Bawley ran into third place, when Andrew Summers tired from the weight.
