It will be welcome news to Canadian turfmen that the horses belonging to the Kirkfield Stable will not be sold, at any rate, not at the present time. While it is premature to say what the ultimate decision may be, it is satisfactory to know that the stable will remain intact and its popular colors be seen during the racing season of 1907.

The Seagram stable will not go to Brighton Beach. They are likely to move from Buffalo direct to Saratoga. Trainer Littlefield started out well by winning a large amount of money and several valuable gold and silver trophies at the Ontario Jockey Club meeting. Since then his success has been very limited. Main Chance, which seems to be the stable's main reliance, ran second in the Buffalo Derby, and has won one race at that meeting, and that is the only bracket so far scored at the Ontario Jockey Club.

TRIALS OF SPEED AT THE EXHIBITION

Something Doing in the Harness Line
Every Day in Front of the Grand Stand.

The speed trials at the Toronto Exhibition will be held on Tuesday, Aug. 27, and succeeding days in front of the grand stand. Entries close on the 15th of August; mile heats, best three in five, hobbles barred. The program: For trotting horses, not having a record lower than 2:50, \$400.

For pacing horses, not having a record lower than 2:50, \$400. For trotting stallions, not less than 15 hands, and that have covered at least fifteen mares during the season of 1906; rosette bill and list to be certified to by owner and presented to judges when called to exhibit if demanded. \$200.

For trotting horses, not having a record lower than 2:50, \$400. For pacers, not having a record lower than 2:50, \$400.
