ANDERSON'S GREAT CATCH FEATURE OF DOUBLE-HEADER Nailed a Long Drive by Grimshaw and Cut Him Out of a Home-Run—Weidy Made Several Sensational Catches, Too—Toronto and Rochester Divided the Two Games.

Toronto and Rochester divided a double-header yesterday at the Island, the visitors winning the first easily by 1 to 3, and the locals grabbing the 2nd contest by 3 to 1. Both games were long and tiresome, lasting from 2 o'clock to 6.45. Barger was hit hard in the first game, but kept the safe ones scattered, while Pfeffer was so wild that he was replaced by Kellogg, who did not do much better. Rudolph pitched cleverly in the second game, Chappelle and Ganzel were put off the grounds in the 5th innings of this contest for disputing a decision, and Snyder finished the game for Rochester.

Features of the Play. Toronto played very poor baseball in the first game, and deserved to lose. Mahling made all of his errors in the first innings, and gave Rochester enough runs to win the game. Catcher Brown made a home run over the right field bleachers in the third. Maloney made a sensational stop in the 4th, and Weidy pulled off a circus catch in the sixth. Mullen made the longest hit of the game in the seventh, a tremendous drive to the left field bleachers for three bases. Anderson made a phenomenal catch in the opening innings of the second game cutting Grimshaw out of a home run. Rudolph pitched a nice steady game, and improved as he went along. Chappelle was always in trouble, and was glad when Umpire Toft put him out of the game in the fifth. Toft had a rather strenuous afternoon, and made several at first base errors. However, both teams suffered as Jack plays no favorites. Toronto pulled off a brilliant double play in the 4th, when Mullen and Maloney got both runners in an attempted double steal with perfect throws. Weidy supplied his usual spectacular catch this time of a hard foul.

Mahling Tossed It Away. Three bad errors by Mahling gave Rochester four runs in the opening innings of the first game. He had two easy chances for double plays, and fell down both times. Anderson singled over short and Holly put safety in left. Patten filed to Grimshaw. Ganzel hit to Mahling, who bobbed it and Anderson scored. Batch hit another at Mahling, who not only fumbled but made a bad throw to third, and Holly and Maloney scored. Ganzel crossed the plate on McDonald's sacrifice fly to Grimshaw. Brown and Barger walked, filling the bases. Anderson ended the inning on McDonald's sacrifice fly. Toronto got four clean hits in their half, but only scored one run. Mullen singled over second, and Weidy hit safely to left. The return throw by Anderson to Patten was muffed, and mullen raced for third. Patten recovered in time to get Mullen. Kelley was hit by the first pitch, and Weidy singled. Mahling forced Mitchell for the last out. Holly opened the second with a two-bagger to center. Patten just failing to make the put out, but the bases were easy ones. In Toronto's half Erik got on McDonald's fumble, but died at first.

A Real Battering Streak. The visitors cut loose a batting streak in the third, scoring four runs on five singles and a homer. With one hand down, McDonald singled and came home on Erwin's home run smash over the right field bleachers. Barger singled to center and Pfeffer was hit at first by Kellogg. Anderson singled to left on first pitched ball, and after Kelly had reached second on a single, and a wild pitch, but Kelley and Grimshaw could not bring him home. Weidy in the Linelight. Weidy was deprived of a hit in the sixth by a great running catch by Kelly. The Toronto fielder walked and picked singly with two out, but Kellogg's best was a grounder to Ganzel. In the seventh a charity to Batch, a wild throw to first by Kellogg, and a two-base hit by Butler, who replaced Patten, gave Rochester another run. Mullen opened Toronto's half with a three-bagger to left, and Weidy followed with a sacrifice fly. Patten got a charity in the eighth, and Ganzel followed with a sacrifice fly. For Toronto Vandy and Prik scored safely, but could not get beyond second. Rochester added two more in the 9th on a home on balls to McDonald, a single by Butler, Barger's sacrifice, a hit peg to third by Vandy, and Anderson's infield out. Scores: Toronto, 4; Rochester, 3.

Anderson's Great Catch. The first innings of the second game was featured by a wonderful catch by Anderson, which incidentally cut Toronto out of two runs. After Pfeffer had singled Grimshaw made a beautiful drive to deep left field over Anderson's head. The left fielder put on an extra burst of speed and caught the ball over his shoulder while on the dead run. The crowd gave him an ovation. Holly got a base on balls in the first, and Ganzel singled in the second, but could not get beyond first base. Chappelle pitched himself out of a bad hole in Toronto's half. Mitchell singled, Mahling was safe on Ganzel's muffed, and Patten bunted safely. Filling the bases with nobody out. First he fanned Prik, then with 3 and 2 on Rudolph, he pitched a low one, and Umpire Toft called it a strike, which raised a big kick by the Kelleys. Mullen ended the innings with a fly to Maloney.

All Occupied Again. Weidy got a charity in the third and was sacrificed to second by Pfeffer. Grimshaw filed to Maloney, and Brown filled the bases on a passed runner. Mahling advanced, filling the bases again. Chappelle got out of another tight spot by fanning Fallon. Holly opened the fourth with a single to center. Patten sacrificed, and Maloney beat out a bunt towards third. Maloney tried to steal, and Mitchell nailed him at second. Mullen's return throw getting Holly at the plate, completing a fast double-play.

Toronto's First Score. Toronto filled the bases again in their half, with one out on Rudolph's single. Holly's fumble of Mullen's grounder, and Weidy's infield hit. Pfeffer hit a long sacrifice fly to batch at the right field bleachers, Rudolph scoring on the play. In the fifth, after Ganzel had fouled, Patten singled to center. Weidy's walk, and a sensational running catch of McDonald's long foul. Batch stole second, and Erwin popped to Mahling. Rochester Players Ejected. The locals filled the bases once more in their half. Mahling beat out a home, Patten singled to center, and Erik filed on his grounder to McDonald. The play was at second base, and the Rochester players made a prolonged kick on the decision. Ganzel and Chappelle were put out of the game, and were replaced by Simmons and Snyder. Erwin threw badly to second to get Patten, and Mahling scored. The other runners advancing a base. Rudolph walked, filling the bases again. Mullen hit to Simmons, forcing Patten at the plate. Weidy walked, scoring Erik and leaving the bases all occupied. Pfeffer out on a close decision. McDonald to Simmons, the former making a great stop of a difficult grounder. Rochester's Lone Tally. In the sixth Snyder hit to left field bleachers for three bases, and scored on Holly's infield out. For Toronto Grimshaw led off with a single, but next three were easy outs.
