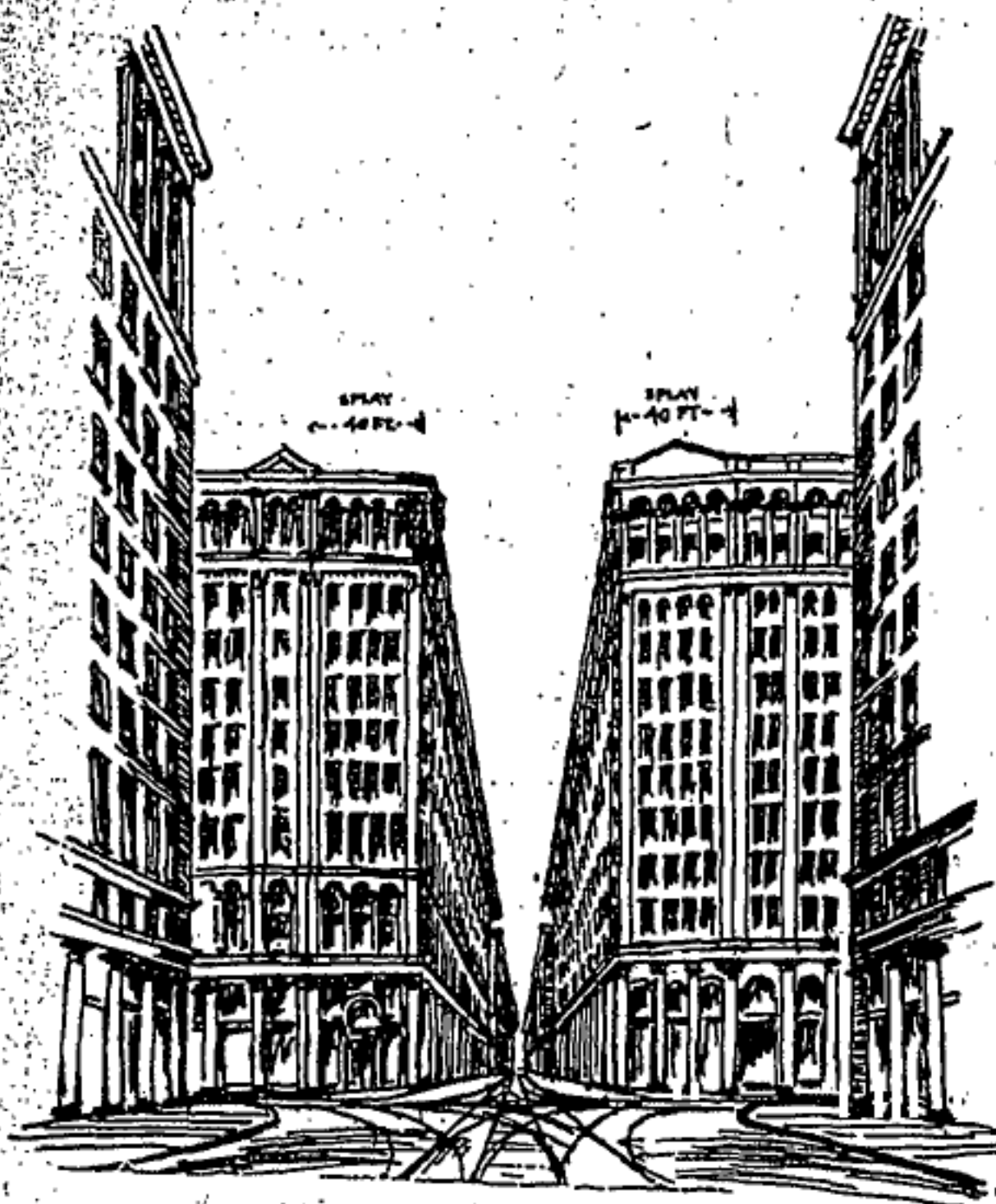


Busy Corners May be Widened
