

HAWTHORNE TO MEET CALGARY AT HAMILTON RACES

Best 2-Year-Olds in America Likely to Meet There at That Meeting.

TIPSAND DEAD OF FEVER

One of the Belmont Horses the Victim—Supervisor Boosted in a Selling Race.

Secretary A. R. Loudon, of the Hamilton Jockey Club, was at the track arranging with horsemen for stabling accommodation. Many leading Kentucky stables, including W. W. Darden and Rome Reeves, will race at Hamilton. Hawthorne, the great 2-year-old, will likely hook up with Mr. Davies' crackerjack Calgary in the stakes for youngsters. At Toronto will be there to see that race.

Tippsand, a three-year-old in August Belmont's stable, died of fever, contracted while being shipped from Pimlico to Toronto.

Ed Cole has received word of his appointment as presiding judge at Marlboro. The meeting at the latter point, which will begin on June 2, will continue for ten days.

Among the visitors from the States at the track yesterday were Phil Dwyer, president of the Brooklyn Jockey Club; Thomas Monahan, owner of Texella and other good horses; and W. S. Fanshaw, whose Silverbrook Stud at Red Bank, New Jersey, has produced a number of good races, among them the Turk. All three of these gentlemen were very much impressed with the racing here, and also at the class of people that the sport attracts.
