Dear Madam: The very first table Forks used were two-pronged? It was as late as the 18th century before they became widely used by any country, and even at that time in France and England they were a decided novelty.

At the beginning of the 18th century the three-pronged Fork became popular, and about the middle of the same century four-pronged Forks, such as are in use today, superseded those with the three prongs.

The Diplomat Who Loved a Queen

Emperor Francis Joseph has just lost through death the commander of his superb Hungarian body guard, whose uniforms are perhaps the most picturesque things of the kind to be seen at the courts of Vienna and Budapest. The commander was General Count Esterhazy, who for the last twenty years of Queen Victoria's reign was as Military Attache of the Austrian Embassy to the Court of St. James, one of the most familiar and popular figures in English society. He was not regarded in England as a foreigner, for through his mother, Lady Sarah Villiers, daughter of the fifth Earl of Jersey, he was related to many of the greatest houses of the British aristocracy.
