

# Three World's Swimming Records Broken

## HE WANTS \$95,000 FOR THREE FIGHTS

### Johnson Willing to Meet Langford, Smith and Moran

#### HIS ARM STILL IN SPLINTS

Champion Has Received No Formal Offer to Fight "Gunboat" Smith in Mexico—His Wealthy Backer in a Hospital.

Paris, Jan. 8.—"Jack" Johnson, the negro heavyweight pugilist, whose arm is still in splints, said this afternoon in reply to an inquiry, that so far he had not received a cable offer of money for a fight with "Gunboat" Smith on the Mexican side of the border of Lower California. He continued: "I am ready to fight if the offer meets my terms, which are \$95,000, but the fight must be subsequent to that which has been definitely fixed to take place in Paris during the first week of June against Frank Moran, the Pittsburgh heavyweight, for which William A. Lester, who is still in a hospital, suffering from a fractured leg, has guaranteed \$10,000. "I expect toward the end of the same month to meet Max Baer, provided the Johnson says his broken arm, which has been radio-photographed progressing well, and the splints are to be removed on Saturday.

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San Francisco, Jan. 8.—There will be no further negotiations for a fight at Tia Juana, Lower California, between Jack Johnson, the heavyweight champion of the world, and "Gunboat" Smith, until the outcome of Johnson's fight with Moran, which is known to the plan was that Johnson and Smith should fight across the Mexican border from San Diego on July 4.

#### GEORGES CARPENTIER MEETS BANDSMAN BLAKE

London, Jan. 8.—A fight has been arranged between Bandsman Blake, the English champion middleweight, and Georges Carpentier, the French champion, for £2,000. Carpentier, in his last fight, which took place at London on December 5, knocked out Bombardier Wells in one round.

#### OLYMPIC FUNDS APPEAL FORMALLY ABANDONED

New York, Jan. 8.—A cable to The Tribune from London says: "A meeting of the special committee for the Olympic games, Berlin, 1916, was held yesterday to consider the position with regard to the public appeal for half a million dollars. The appeal was first made in August, 1912, and the definite statement was made in October that unless the fund reached \$125,000 by the end of a year the committee would not be justified in proceeding further with the matter. "It is understood that the amount received is less than half the minimum. No information has been given as to what took place at yesterday's meeting, and it is declared that no statement will be issued until after the special committee has made its report to the British Olympic Council.

#### A NEW CLUBHOUSE FOR QUEEN CITY YACHT CLUB

The Queen City Yacht Club has commenced the organization of a \$50,000 company to erect a new clubhouse on the club's new site near Ward's Island. The plans call for a three-story building on a cement foundation, with a marine railway and tennis courts and bowling lanes. The new club will have a grand opening on the 25th of the month. The building will be commenced next fall.

#### THREE WORLD'S RECORDS BROKEN BY SWIMMERS IN CHICAGO LAST NIGHT

Chicago, Jan. 8.—Three world's records, the 120 yards, 200 and 250 yards, were broken to-night in the first swim for the central amateur athletic championships. First honors going to the Illinois Athletic Club's H. J. Hether and Perry McGillivray were the record-breakers. Hether won the 250 yards race in 2 minutes 21 seconds. The record was held by C. M. Daniels of New York in 2:25 1/2. Hether also lowered the 200 yards record in this race, making the distance in 2:07 3/5 against C. Healy's former time of 2:11 1/2. Perry McGillivray won the 120 yards race in 48 seconds. McGillivray swam an extra length of the tank, going 120 yards in 1:08 3/5, lowering Daniels' record of 1:10. Perry McGillivray also won the 48 yards swim in 12.35.

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#### POT KEEPS ABOLING OVER THE FIRES OF THE FEDERAL LEAGUE

National Commissioning these days isn't what it was in the early and giddy wine-soaked past. This steering the ship of organized baseball between the rocks of the Federal League and the shoals of the Fraternity demands a steady hand.

When some one comes up with \$15,000 in cold cash and offers it to a player with a promise of \$10,000 in addition at the end of three years something more than a lawsuit needs to be conjured up to hold the man in line, especially if he has been trailing along in fact company for five or six seasons at about \$5,000 per.

Jim Gilmore comes back at organized baseball pretty hard when he points out that his attempts were made last summer to get Federal League players to break their contracts. It makes Hergermann's shout of unспортmanship sound hollow.

The Federals are aiming at a vulnerable spot in existing the players out of the fold. It is one thing to have a palatial park and another thing to have a clubhouse. They want to break the old boys' habit of coming to get the territory first, feeling that there is plenty of territory to go when the time comes.

It would be a painful joke on organized baseball if the Federal League actually should succeed. There is a maximum in the game that raises the unexpected to the level of certainty.

Jan Johnson took occasion to scold Dave Fultz heartily for not coming to the game. He demanded drawn up by the lawyer. It was not a little boy after receiving a spanking telling his father he would be sorry some day.

Hepburn, M.P., owner of the Toronto franchise, asking him to sign with him.

Owens said he expected to visit Toronto, Ontario, and would meet with the club's home town, shortly when he would meet the Toronto club's manager, and if he is "touched," he said, "I shall accept it."

Montreal and Cincinnati are the latest cities to be denied admittance to the Federal League. President Gilmore of the Federal League is quoted as saying that Providence is a good ball town. It looks as though the weaker teams will have trouble getting players next season. Dave Robertson, the recruit of the Giants, who has not yet won his spurs in fact company, has announced that he will jump to the outfielders should any attempt be made to sell him to the Cardinals.

Johnny Bates of the Reds is refereeing prize fights this winter. He gets along nicely, but it is alleged that when a preliminary boxer named Klein was introduced the other night John Miller, Jr., beat him. A man gave the decision to Klein's opponent before the first bell had rung.

Catcher Bill Kelly, who was released to the Toronto club recently by the Pittsburgh Pirates, seems to find it necessary to mix with the argonauts each fall. Last year he had a broken finger that he nursed most of the winter. He has now just gone through an operation for removal of a growth in his nose. The Toronto club has announced that they did their job well and have sent Kelly to his old home, the Pittsburgh Pirates, saying that he will be all right next year.
