MATTAGART AND BRUCE CHOSEN BY LIBERALS

Chairman of the Board of Education to Give W. D. McPherson a Battle.

HENRY WINS AGAIN Defeated Ball and Burgess—Dr. Godfrey Unanimously Nominated.

The Liberals of North-west Toronto chose as their candidate, Mr. W. O. McTaggart, chairman of the Board of Education, for seat '23,' at their meeting in Sovereign Hall, Dovercourt road, on Saturday evening. A goodly number of people attended the meeting, and showed their approval in decisive fashion when the announcement of his selection was made by chairman Mr. R. D. Ross.

Mr. G. L. Wilson prophesied that Mr. McTaggart would put up the greatest battle soon in years. Their candidate was a good, clean man. Mr. McTaggart said: "I have been known in Liberalism, and I have known not much else in the course of my life from the political standpoint. I have believed, and still continue to believe, that the Liberal party is the one that is the progressive party in this day and age. However, I do not believe in this election as purely between Liberals and Conservatives. I recognize that I am to win in this election I must have the support of a large number of our Conservative friends. I recognize it as a crusade, as a moral issue."

Mr. A. G. Bruce chosen. The Liberals of West York on Saturday afternoon selected Mr. A. G. Bruce to uphold the Liberal dignity in the pending election, at their meeting in St. Lawrence Hall. The name was proposed by H. G. Kirby, and carried by a large majority. Mr. Bruce was accorded a big ovation. "I am going to win, or I am going to come as close to the goal as is humanly possible. I accept this nomination only on two conditions. They are that the election is certain to be a personal and active interest in the campaign, and that each will help in the securing of the necessary funds. In the first place, the energy men will show will mean scores of votes. And I have personally refused to accept money from a general campaign fund. I had rather be beaten by 1,000 majority under these conditions than to win under any other."

Henry in East York. Geo. S. Henry, M.P.P. for East York, again received his followers' confidence at the Conservative meeting of the riding held in the Labor Temple on Saturday afternoon. The two other nominees, Dr. W. E. F. Ross and Mr. H. H. Ish, receiving a comparatively small vote. "I was always absolutely opposed to the Government Bill. COBURN MAY RUN IN WEST SIMCOE

The Steamer Majestic Will Be Missed From Lake Ontario This Year.

It is quite possible that Rev. John Coburn, pastor of Zion Methodist Church, West Simcoe, will be nominated to-day by the Liberal Temperance convention of West Simcoe, as their candidate in the coming general elections for the Ontario Legislature.

Mr. Coburn is well known in the West Simcoe riding, where he holds pastorates for several years. He has also taken part in many local option campaigns in Simcoe, which is very largely under local option. The sitting member for the constituency is the Hon. James Duff, Minister of Agriculture, who was elected by acclamation at the last election. The nominal Conservative majority there is about nine hundred. Mr. Coburn is himself generally a supporter of the Conservative party, although he considers it his duty to break away from it on the abolition of the bar issue, and with the temperance issue as a feature, he is expected to stand a good chance of winning the riding from the Government column.

Mr. Coburn stated his position plainly before his congregation yesterday morning, so, he said, there should be no misunderstanding. He had previously met his quarry on the board, and his fellow pastors in the district, who were practically unanimous in urging him to stand for the nomination. It may be added that Mr. Coburn's congregation strongly supports him in the fearless and independent stand he is taking in temperance and other moral issues of the day.
