OTTAWA COLLEGE TEAM IN WILD RIOT AT CLEVELAND

One Player in Hospital, Another Charged With Assault—College Team Plays St. Michael's To-Night at the Arena.

Minus one player, who is under arrest on a charge of assault, and another in the hospital with a gashed head, Ottawa College's hockey team, which plays St. Michael's at the Arena to-night, arrived last night from Cleveland. They played Cleveland a series of three games, losing the first Thursday, tying the second Friday, and the third on Saturday wound up in a wild riot, in which police, players, and spectators, sticks, skates, and bottles were in a fierce mix-up.
