The Argonaut-Victoria fixture will be the attraction at the Arena to-night. Both teams are in good shape, and an interesting game is assured. The fans are anxious to witness these two teams in action, as it will afford them an opportunity of forming an idea regarding the relative strength of the teams in the two senior groups, the winners of which, St. Michaels and Vics, will meet in the senior O.H.A. finals on Tuesday. Robertson silverware. To-night's game will commence at 8.30 o'clock. "Chad" Tomes will referee.

The first of the home-and-home games in the third round in the junior O.H.A. championship race between Varsity and St. Andrew's College will take place at the Arena tomorrow afternoon. It should be a battle royal. St. Andrew's have improved very much of late, while Varsity have, the fans think, one of the finest little junior teams seen here in years. Both colleges will be on hand with a full band of rosters, and a lively afternoon's sport should result. The game will commence at 3 o'clock.

The second game between St. Andrew's and Varsity will be played at the Arena next Friday night.

Alleged to Be "Joe Moines" of the Peterboro Club—Tomorrow Night's Game.

The big "pro" game of the season locally is the game at the Arena tomorrow night between the rivals, Toronto and Shamrocks. In the two previous meetings between these teams the Torontos have won by one goal on each occasion. The Shamrocks expect to be at full strength again. Skinner has entirely recovered and will play right wing, with Corbet Denny and Roman at centre and Cyril Denny and a new player, whose appearance here will be of great interest to hockey fans. This new player is none other than Joe Tetrault, who is alleged to be one and the same Moines, the Peterboro player whom the O.H.A. has been investigating. Tetrault is a defence man as well as a forward, with both N.H.A. and Maritime League experience. This player's appearance on the Shamrocks' line-up, if he is the man the O.H.A. are after, will create a sensation. Toronto and Shamrocks each (time they have met this winter have provided by far the most exciting N.H.A. hockey witnessed, and kept the spectators on their feet from start to finish. With George McNamara as well as Skinner in the game again, the Irishmen are confident of turning the tables on Jack Marshall's team, but the latter always put up the very best they have in them when they clash with the Shamrocks and that fur will fly goes without saying. In Corbet Denny Shamrocks have one of the fastest and perhaps most spectacular forward in the league, and his brother looks like a find also. The Torontos are right on edge and will take a lot of beating. There has already been a big demand for seats, and a capacity crowd is indicated. Jack Brown may not be in the game, as he is still ill.

ST. ANDREWS QUALIFY FOR THE THIRD ROUND

Easily Defeated Oshawa in Jr. O.H.A.—Watson and Cantley the Stars.

Oshawa juniors were eliminated from the race for the O. H. A. honors when they were beaten 11 to 3 by St. Andrew's at the Arena last night. It was the return game of the home-and-home second round series, the first of which was also won by the college lads by 10 to 8.

It was a tidy little game, and although hopelessly outclassed, the Oshawa youngsters put up a stubborn battle most of the time. They plainly lacked experience, however, and failed to penetrate St. Andrew's three-man defence effectively.

On the attack the locals were too speedy for the visitors, and they also checked back so persistently that the easterners were seldom really dangerous. During the greater part of the evening the Oshawas were on the defensive.

St. Andrew's assumed the aggressive from the outset. Before the first period expired Scott had twice found the net and Cantley once. St. Andrew's leading 2 to 0, Cantley secured another brace of tallies during the second period, while Watson got one. A few minutes before the second intermission Kellow broke the ice for the visitors' first counter.

He also checked hard and displayed lots of speed, but failed to pass at opportune times, and roamed considerably.

Rogers put up great hockey in the early stages for College, but had little to do in the closing period. The other also distinguished themselves at various times and round at a nicely-balanced team, which is showing improvement every time out.

PLAYERS WERE DOPED IN THE HAMILTON RINK

Tiger Management Hunting for the Miscreant—The Collingwood Charges.

The Collingwood Enterprise charges that the Collingwood hockey players were "doped" in their recent visit to Hamilton, but the club does not blame the Tiger Hockey Club or anyone connected with it, alleging that it was the work of some unknown miscreant. The O.H.A. asked the Hamilton club for an explanation, but the club had already started an investigation of its own.

The Enterprise says: "The facts of the case as given to us are as follows, and readers can draw their own conclusions: A pall of ice water was placed in our boys' dressing room for their convenience during the game, and the only player who did not drink from it was the goalkeeper, Clark. All the other players used it, as did several Collingwood boys who went with our team, and one other, a Hamilton boy who formerly worked for A. H. Johnson here, and knew all our fellows. The results were that every one of our players was knocked out more or less with cramps."

"Foulis had to be taken off the ice before the game was over, while at the close of the game all our players collapsed and had to be carried in to attend to them. Some of them are still suffering from the effects. Had it only been the Collingwood team who were doped, they would have put it down to the change of water, but when a man who has resided in Hamilton for three years is also seriously affected, the matter looks more serious. Foulis was the first to drink the water and took more than the others, and was the first to succumb. He had a drink of water before the game and a drink till between the second and third periods, and did not have to give up during the game, although having bad cramps towards the close. Several of our players found it hard to complete the game, but struggled on bravely. All the boys had drunk water at the hotel before the game and suffered no ill effects, but everyone who drank out of the pall provided for them at the rink complained of the same effects."

ORILLIA IN THE FINALS

District Cup Games Unfinished Because of the Weather.

The mild weather necessitated the stoppage of play in the semifinals of the District Cup competition yesterday, and it will be resumed when Secretary G. S. Pearcey of the Ontario Curling Association notifies the clubs to do so.

In the first round at the Victoria Rink Orillia defeated Port Hope by 41 to 28, and later beat Lindsay, which had won by default from Palmerston, by 34 to 27. G. Sinclair, a member of the Orillia rink skipped by W. E. Robbins, was taken ill and was unable to play. This necessitated the playing of two pairs of stones by W. C. George, the lead, and the giving of four shots to Orillia opponents in both games, as provided by the rules in such cases.

At the Queen City Rink Waterloo won from Toronto Lakeview by 32 to 31, and Hamilton Thistles got their game by default from London Thistles. There was such a decided change in the weather that Hamilton Thistles refused to play, and they will meet Waterloo to decide which club shall play Orillia in the finals.

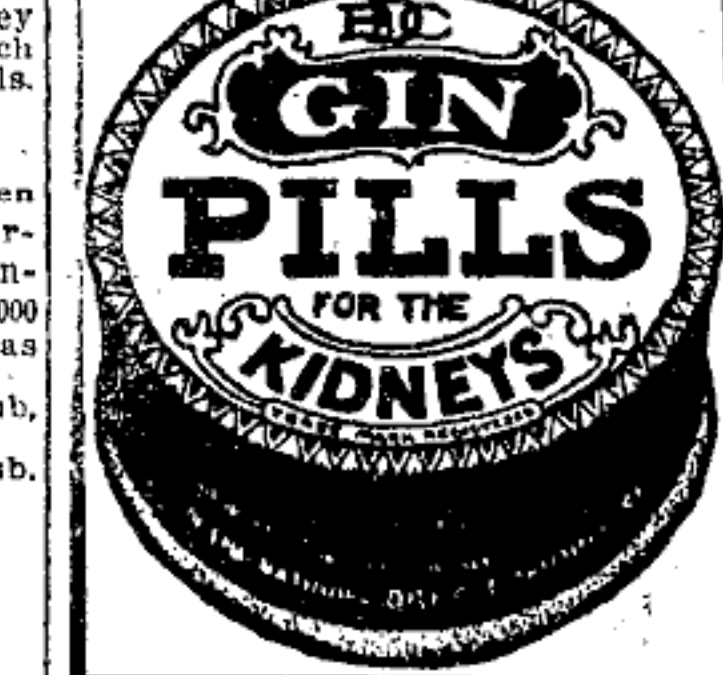
