Property Owners Suggest Extension of Sherbourne Street—Million Outlay Involved

If the proposals of some of the North Rosedale property-owners mature, the map of that section of the city will be materially changed. The lack of street car accommodation and the need for immediate improvement along that line has suggested the idea to some of the residents that in the event of the second Glen road bridge being reconstructed to provide for street car traffic, it would be a much better proposal to extend Sherbourne street northward from its present terminus at South drive.

It is estimated that it would require at least a million dollars to carry out this plan. In addition to the cost of a new bridge, which would have to be very lengthy span, there would be damage to properties on the north side of South drive, both sides of Crescent road, and to the rear of lots on South road. The extension of the street would cut right through the properties on South drive and Crescent road, and the city would have to pay the full value of these properties, owing to the fact that the owners would have to vacate them and seek homes elsewhere.

The second Glen road bridge is too weak to carry the street car traffic necessary for the northern section of Rosedale, and the cost of reconstructing the bridge would be almost as great as the cost of a new bridge. This being the case, it is considered the right time to agitate for the extension of Sherbourne street. Those who are promoting this improvement fear that there might be some opposition from those who would be immediately affected, but they are confident that it will meet with the approval of the majority of the property-owners in that part of the city. It is not probable that the city would bear the cost of the undertaking, and it is advanced at all the Works Committee of the City Council will see that it is done on the local improvement plan.
