

S. W. SALMON RESIGNS OFFICE IN THE Q.C.Y.C.

Popular Secretary Forced to Relinquish His Duties—La Blanche Sold.

R.C.Y.C. HOLDS OPEN RACE

After eight or nine years' service, S. W. Salmon, honorary secretary of the Queen City Yacht Club, has resigned, and E. W. Pugh succeeds him. Sammy Salmon is one of the old club stand-bys. He was a member years ago when the club occupied small premises behind the Toronto Canoe Club, and he has had the satisfaction of seeing the club work up to its present strong position. He was an active sailor, and in the days when the sixteen-footers and skimming dishes were popular, sailed on many winning boats, but was not signed on the club, but cannot spare the time to handle the secretaryship.

The cabin cruising sloop, La Blanche, of the Queen City Yacht Club fleet, has been sold by W. J. ("Shorty") Hales to Tommy Wrenshall. Wrenshall will shortly be moving and give her a new high-peaked main sail and single jib, and replace her centreboard, which Hales sailed her without last season. He expects to show something in the Queen City Yacht Club races this season. Hales, who sold the boat and returned from the game, is one of the best racing skiff sailors the Q.C.Y.C. ever had. He used to sail the famous green boat Escape, and won several championships with her.

Joseph Wright, the Argo coach, goes to Ann Arbor, Michigan, tonight to referee the first University of Michigan rowing regatta. The university is holding races for their class eights and a special race between Grand Rapids and Detroit.

The promising Argo senior eight had not been out for two weeks, owing to the weather and the absence of Clerk, who has been rowing No. 4. Clerk is after an officers' commission. Coach Joe Wright is trying to get Clerk Murphy out to buy with the Irish Fusillers. If Murphy comes out, Argo will have a faster eight than last season. They need Murphy badly, for they have to face the Duluth crews again at the Canadian Henley. The Duluth crews won the senior fours and the Double Blue are very keen to get even. In fact, they would deem it a calamity to let Duluth clean them up at their regatta. Duluth are sending down a big bunch by boat to Buffalo for the Henley.

The R.C.Y.C. season opens to-morrow, with two races for the smaller classes. One race is for the 16-foot skiff class and the other up at their regatta. There will be 14 skiffs in the race, four from the N.Y.C., four from the Alexandras, two from the Queen City, and four from the R.C.Y.C. The dinghy class will attract at least 20 boats, the N.Y.C. alone entering eleven boats.

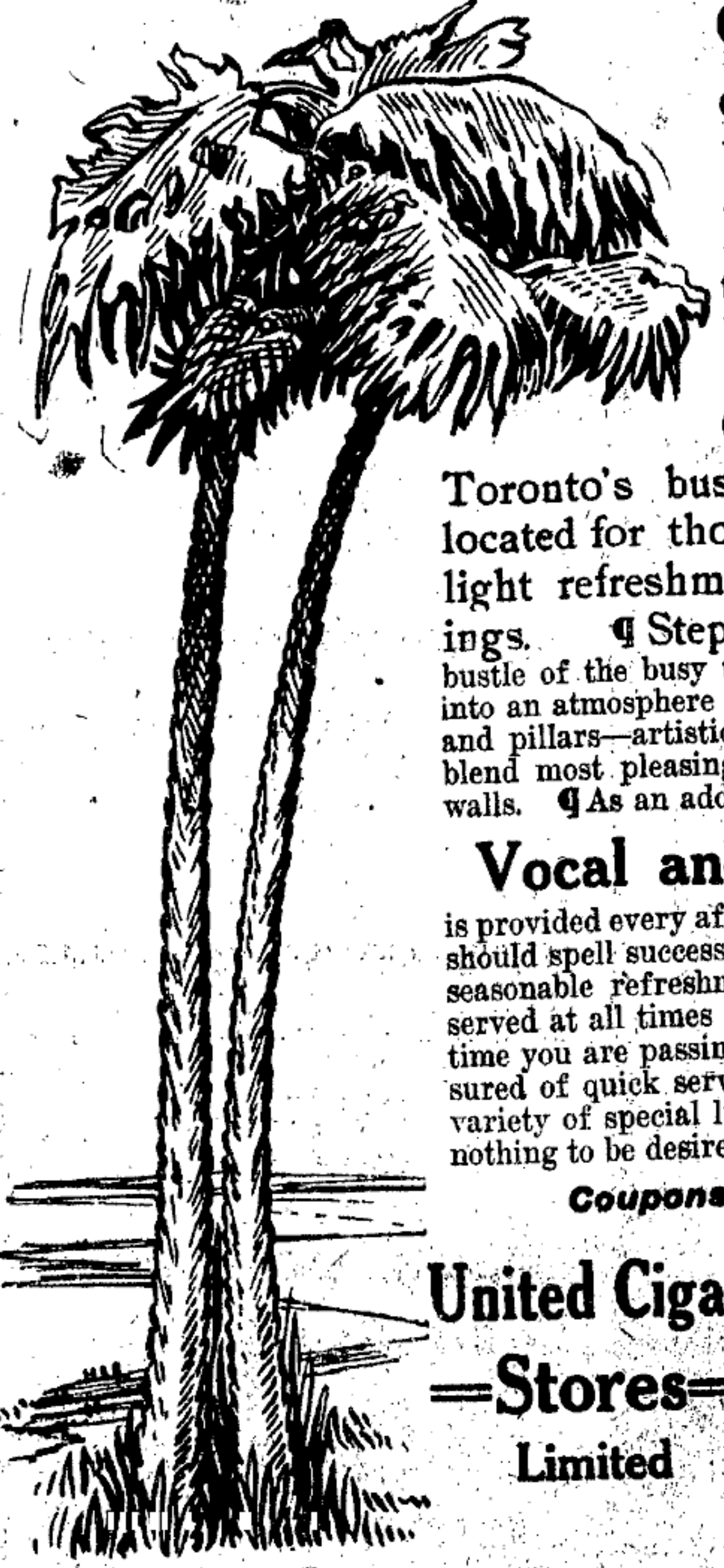
