

FAILED TO TOUCH FIRST BASE AFTER GETTING THE BALL

Fred Herbert's Omission Started Rochester on Their Way to Score Four Runs.

HERCHE HELD LEAFS TO A SINGLE RUN

Several Chances to Score, But the Leafs Weren't There With the Punch.

Rochester, June 10.—Rochester beat Toronto 4 to 1 yesterday in the final game of the series, the damage all being done in one inning.

Herbert pitched fine ball except in the fourth, when he was upset by several acts of omission by his teammates. He was opposed by Herche, who pitched surprisingly well in the pitches for the home club.

In the sixth and seventh innings, the Leafs had no hits. In the fourth, Smith, the first man up, was credited with a scratch hit when Herbert, the Toronto pitcher, failed to come down on first base after taking a throw from Graham. He had the ball in time, but did not step on the sack. Pletz, the second man, fled to Parent. Not so with Kores. He drove a double to right. Smith only got to third, and would have been held there had O'Hara's return been fielded by anybody. The ball struck the ground not far from first base and bounced on almost to the Toronto bench. Herbert, Hollander, and Koehler, anyone of whom could have recovered it, all stood still. It permitted Smith to score and Kores to reach third. Herbert was all upset, and so were the rest of the Leafs. Hits followed by Holke, Priest, and Williams, which, with an error by Koehler at first, resulted in a holding throw from O'Hara, and a wild pitch, made it possible for the Hunters to make their return home club, which could do nothing against Herbert afterwards.

Sprinter's Fifth Consecutive Victory and Eleventh Win in Her Last Twelve Starts.

Special to The Star.—Montreal, June 10.—H. S. Newman's Pan Zareta once more demonstrated at Blue Bonnets yesterday that she stands out above all the sprinters of this circuit. She shouldered 134 pounds and outran her opposition from flag to wire in the third race, and won handsily by a length from Carbide. The latter boldly challenged the winner in the last quarter, but was unequal to the occasion. It was the fifth consecutive victory for the speedy sprinter. She has won only once in her last twelve starts, a truly remarkable record. Robt. Davies Southern Maid ran along with Zareta for three furlongs, then retired and finished a bad last. Deposit was a distant third.

Stalwart Helen was in a softer spot than in her recent races, and ran over Knight's Differ and Bushy Head in the final furlongs of the race. The latter assumed the lead when Knight's Differ weakened entering the stretch, but tired under pressure and was overtaken by Helen. She lasted to nose Martian out of the place. The latter ran a good race, but Ricoll, an expected contender, was never prominent.

Hon. J. S. Hendrie's Good Shot surprised "the talent" when he came through with a leading victory over Barore in the opening dash for Canadian-bred maiden two-year-olds. Ban Shore had no excuses and was not good enough to hold the flame held the balance safe.

Won "Little Big Four" Match Yesterday by an Innings and 17 Runs.
