When it is remembered that Rector has beaten Charlie White and Johnny Dundee, and has fought a draw with Joe Weiling it has been realized what type of fighter has been chosen to box the world's champion.

Since Leonard's acquisition of the world's title by his sensational knockout victory over Fred Welsh, everybody has been eager to see his next action in the ring. However, it is difficult now to get these days, and it was only after considerable trouble that the S. P. A. were successful in securing his services. Although Leonard has been in the front rank of lightweight for years, he has not until now held the title. In their first battle that he came to be regarded as a championship proposition. In the return bout Leonard was a close loser, but then started the boxing world by scoring a clean knockout over Ritchie Mitchell, considered the lightweight champion of America. The result of Leonard's third bout with Welsh is well known. The Harlequin knocked out Welsh for the first time in his career. Then came the surprise, the brilliant featherweight champion also having to bite the dust for the first time in his career. Leonard is considered to be the greatest boxer that ever held the lightweight title.
