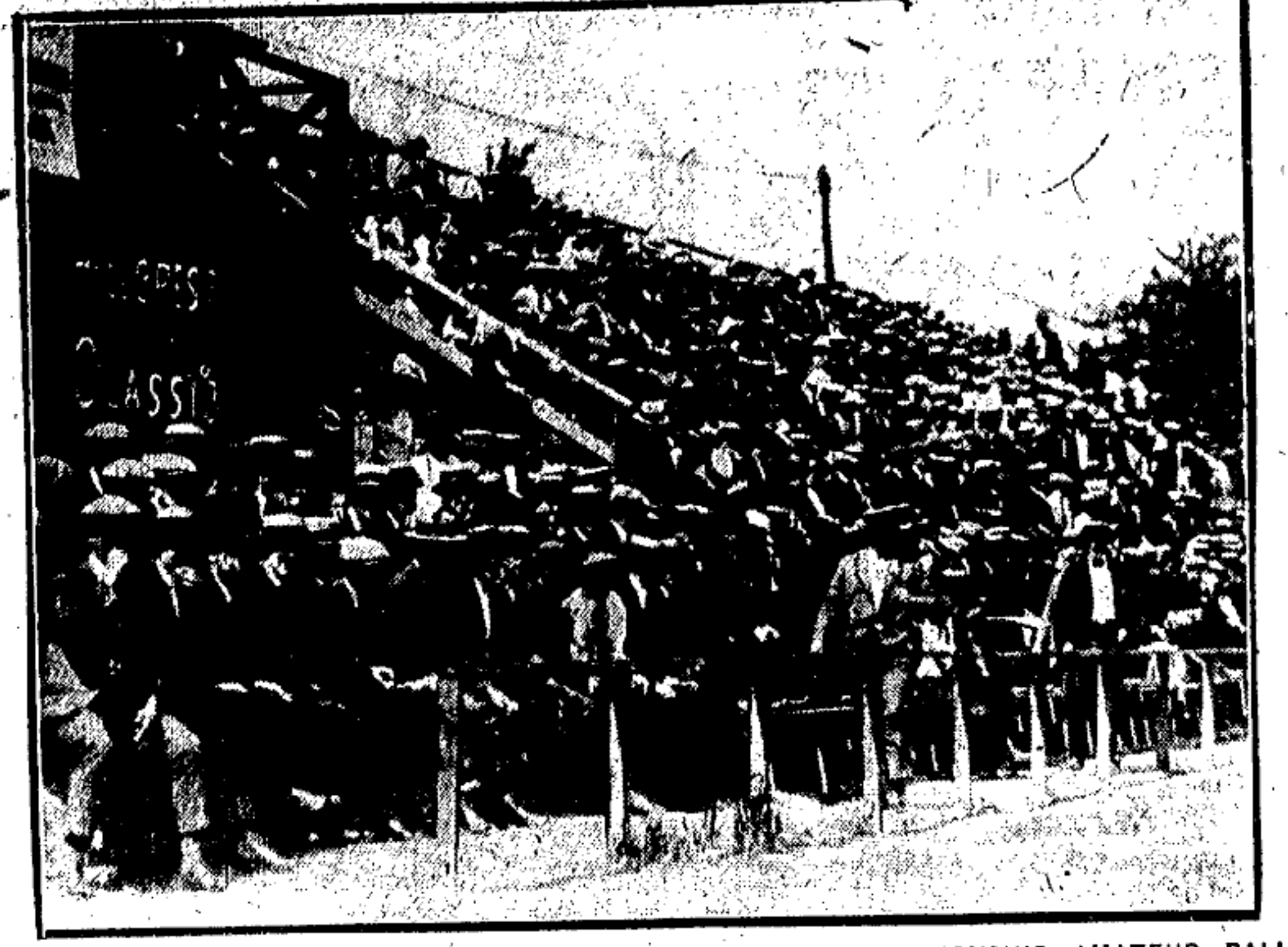
Hillcrests were too good for Classics. The most-derided team, especially in the hitting line. The Greenwood Park players may have been stage-struck because they certainly did not play up to form.

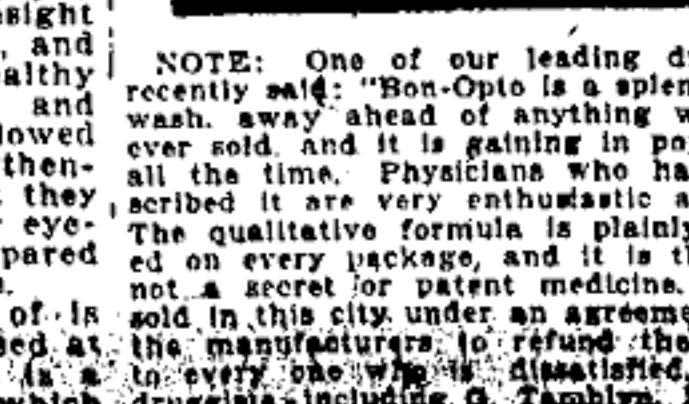
A WIN FOR OAKVILLE.

Patterson and Wood Meet Tilden and Richards for U.S. Title—Local Games.

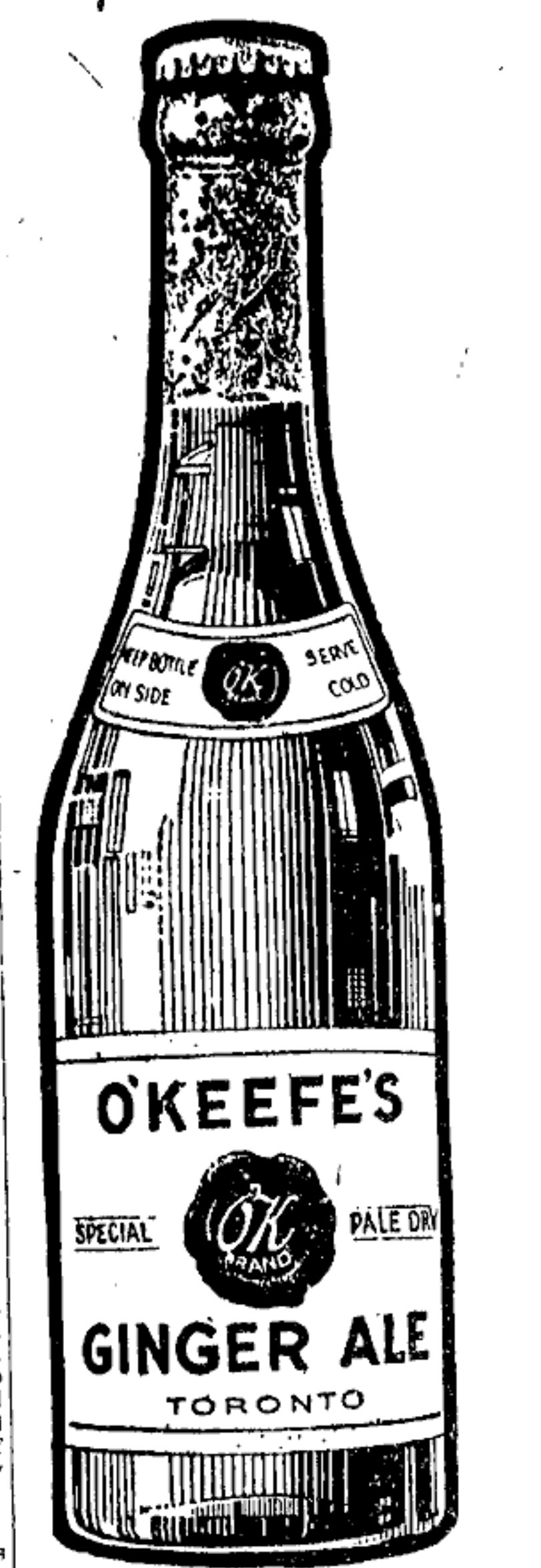
