

14 ONSLOW AND O'Rourke LED BATTING SPREE Homer, Triple and Two Singles for First Baseman in 16-5 Win Over Newark.

SECOND FOR TAYLOR Smart Fielding by Toronto Infielders—Drove Left-Hander From the Rubber.

Newark, April 25.—The Leafs find a new pitcher with Newark today and then move over to Baltimore for a four-game series. Don Howley's men got sweet revenge on Alky Levine's crew for Sunday's disaster by beating the locals 16 to 5 in Tuesday's game.

It was a particularly satisfying victory for the Leafs as they battered left-hander off the rubber in two innings and then finished the game in a succession of four runs in the fourth, two in the fifth, five more in the seventh and another in the eighth. Eddie Oslawski led the Toronto hitters with a home run, a triple and two singles. Oslawski's homer was a deep center field and was one of the longest hits ever made inside the Harrison Field grounds. Frank O'Rourke had a double and three singles in five times up. The Leafs got a total of 17 hits.

Another For Taylor. Taylor pitched for Toronto and always had the Bears, and his teammates had their hitting clothes on. Mike Vincent caught a foul popup but did not back Taylor's support, there being only four putouts made outside the diamond.

The Bears made five mistakes for five runs. O'Rourke hit for the first time since his last season with the Pacific Coast League, made two perfects. Andy Anderson, last year with Toronto, also had two hits, a single and a double.
