

JUDGE FULLER WINS WOODSTOCK PLATE'S 3900 FT. RUNNING

Great Holiday Crowd Attends Running of Woodstock Plate

Thirty-eighth Renewal of Event for 3-Year-Olds Is Won by Judge Fuller—Queen's Hotel Cup, Handicap, to General Thatcher, Top Weight

BARON BYNG AGAIN ATTENDS IN STATE

Spectacular Spill Mars Running of Third Race—Victoria Stakes and Breeders' Stakes Features of Today's Racing

That the King's Plate is the most attractive event on the racing calendar of the Ontario Jockey Club was somewhat forcibly demonstrated at Woodbine Park yesterday, when, despite improved weather, a national holiday and an alluring card of races, the attendance was 22,000, or about 3,000 less than on Saturday, when the Plate was run.

Those who attended the holiday racing were smiling upon spasmodically by Old Sol, whose cheery rays, after several days of raw and uninviting weather, were heartily welcomed by the racers. The difference in the attendance was scarcely noticeable, the entire enclosure being again crowded almost to the point of discomfort.

Their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Byng again attended. The great crowd broke into cheers as the inspiring music made its way along the course from the easterly entrance on Woodbine Avenue to the members' enclosure, where their Excellencies were received by the officials of the club and escorted to the Vice-Regal box.

The band of the Royal Grenadiers played "O Canada" and "The Maple Leaf," while Lord Byng acknowledged the playing of the national anthem, which stood at attention during the playing of the National Anthem while the Vice-Regal representatives "alighted from the State Coach."

Shortly before the running of the first race the wind, which searched every nook of the stands and enclosure up to that time, veered from out of the south around to the west and into the north. When the cold breeze was in that quarter the spectators were sheltered by the towering stands, and the conditions were then such as to make the racing more enjoyable.

An Historic Fixture. Outstanding on the day's program of new events was the Victoria Stakes, which in 1858, when the Industrial City was a centre of racing and the breeding industry flourished in the hands of Forbes, Burgess and other stables were prominent in United States and Canadian racing.

Handicapped by Mrs. C. Wilson's Spire, a three-year-old mare, who was broken in the fall, Jockey Pete Walls escaped with a bruised nose and mouth. Jockey Buck, who was riding for the well-appointed new stable of Cabin Maid, was thrown and landed a severe injury to his right leg.

Mr. L. A. Livingston scored a popular win for the second time at the Victoria Stakes, which was run at the two-mile course. Jockey N. Harris, his colored rider, was unseated and was hit by one of the horses following. He was removed to the club hospital, but disappeared after a couple of hours. Portions of the winner were retained for the first turn of the field. Handson, which promised to be a strong contender, was thrown by the jockey and landed a severe injury to his right leg.

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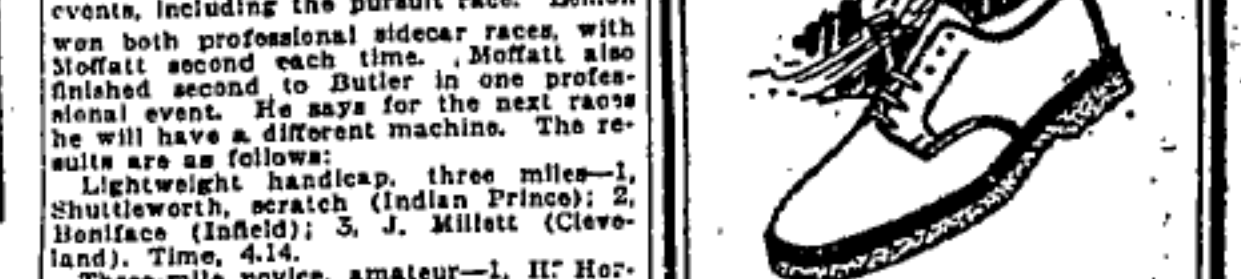
