

LEAF'S SHAKY PESTS
GAIN ON BALTIMORE

The Champions Lose Three at Rochester, While Howleyites Win Two

KELLY'S 19TH HOMER
Satterfield and Gibson Turn In Good Pitching Performances at Island

The Leafs made notable gains all down the line over the week-end and are now safely entrenched in second place five games back of the Birds, who lost three to Rochester, Saturday 2 to 1, and yesterday 3 to 5 and 2 to 1. In the meantime the Leafs need the Pests twice, 14 to 6 and 10 to 2, and enjoy as a consequence a three-game margin over the Skeeters. If they can hold the performance this afternoon Donovan's outfit will not prove a menace for a while at least. Howley's men showed Rube Zollner no mercy in the opening game on Saturday, batting the left-hander who beat them twice recently at Jersey City so hard that he was not in evidence when the game wound up. Five runs in the first innings, a homer by Otis Miller with two on gave the locals a lead that the visitors could not overcome. Stewart was yanked in the second innings and Satterfield finished in the style. Gillmore had four of the Leafs' 17 hits and led both teams, with Red Holt of the Pests chasing him closely for the honors. Holt connected for a homer, a double and single. Freitag and Cantrell also had four baggers. All the Leafs, with the exception of Stewart, had one or more hits.

Lefty Yowell was too good for the Birds in the first game of the double-header on Sunday and won his second start 7 to 5. The Colts battled Owen Out, Onslow and Quill each having three hits. Henry Thormahlen outpitched Jackson and Cobb in the second game, which saw the Colts again victors, 2 to 1. Onslow again fanned well, securing two of the Colts' hits.

Waldence and Buffalo broke even, as Syracuse again downed Rondwith Parks opposing Schroder and Wilson. The score was 11 to 3, and Nobergall, Rootger, Hafey and Smith had home runs.

Before the local squabble over the girls' team started it looked as though the Canadian team would be strong in the long distance events. With the two fastest sprinters in Canada, Misses Grossa and Rosenfeld, sticking to their decision not to compete in the trials, the sprint section of the team was weakened but a new star in the field events was discovered in the person of Miss Jean Godson of Toronto, who did splendidly in the shot put, javelin and discus events. Miss Godson is a sure pistol winner. Miss Josie Dymont of Jerseyville was prominent in the 100 yards, she nosing out Miss Myra Cook. The host on Saturday played hard with the girls in the long distance events, and may have been responsible for the fatigues of several of the runners in the 200 and 400 yard races. They showed remarkable grit and courage in spite of the handicap. They maintain these are no distances for Canadian girls to travel. Canada's team is probably not as strong as it might be but the committee refused to confer to induce to induce other athletes to compete, and when several of Toronto's best prospects refused to compete the committee had no other alternative than to select the best from amongst those competing and as they stated that only those competing on Saturday would be allowed to go, they could not very well do anything else than pick out the best. Several old time athletes who watched the performances, and that with proper coaching between now and August the girls should be going near records.

Sporting Views and Reviews

The victory of Willard Crocker of Montreal in the Canadian men's singles lawn tennis championship at Vancouver was not unexpected, nor was the victory of Crocker and his partner, Jack Wright, in the doubles. In the second set of the singles Crocker had to play 34 games before a decision was reached, which created a new record for championship play in Canadian tennis. His opponent was Wallace Scott of Tacoma.

Toronto swimmers made a splendid showing in the men's short distance championships at Montreal. The evergreen Siler Mendelson, of West End, won the 200-yards, breast stroke, very easily and Earl Warner, of Central Y., set a new Canadian record in winning the 100 yards back stroke. Tommy Walker, of West End Y., of whom much was expected, finished 2nd to Clayton Bourne of McGill in the 100-yard speed race. Toronto ladies won most of their events at Montreal a week ago and in the long distance events yet to be held this city should provide some real contention.

Baltimore's lead is not so pronounced as it was a few days ago, and the Leafs may be in a position to knock the Birds off their lofty perch when they come here next week. Saturday's two clean-out wins over Jersey City were most helpful, inasmuch as the Colts, who are going great guns just now, whipped the champions thrice, two by the same scores, 2 to 1. Incidentally Eddie Onslow, ex-Leaf, was extremely prominent in the slaughter of the Flock. The former manager-captain-firstbaseman of the Toronto club had five hits in the twin tilts.

The team to represent Canada in the girls' track and field meet to be held at Stamford Bridge August 1 was selected after the trial meet held at Varsity stadium on Saturday, and those in charge are satisfied that the Canadians will make a good showing in England. The absence of several local stars was noticeable, and it is unfortunate that they did not compete. However, they have their own reasons and the team will have to get along without them. The athletes were chosen on merit and performance alone, and did exceptionally well in unfamiliar events. Several new stars were discovered and there is no doubt but that Canada will be excellently represented at Stamford. The whole trip will be in charge of the ladies themselves with Miss Alexandrine Gibb, of Toronto, as manager, and Miss Findlay, Montreal, as chaperone.

An unusual thing happened at Fort Erie on Saturday when the stewards rang a big bell in the stand ordering the starter to let the field away in the 4th race after an 8 minutes' delay at the barrier. The delay was caused by the fractious behavior of two horses, Avipsa and Dunoon. The bell was a new one to Canadian race-goers, but Steward J. B. Campbell said that it had often been used in Maryland and Kentucky to obviate long delays at the post. No attention, he said, should have been paid to the two horses in question after a reasonable time had elapsed, as it was unfair to the rest of the place.

The Inter-Provincial Rugby Union has followed the lead of the Ontario Union and the Intercollegiate and appointed permanent officials for the football games in the fall. This is the proper procedure. It gives the officials, players and public more confidence and tends to a more uniform interpretation of the rules. The men selected by the Big Four are all competent and fearless and the appointments will end the frequent squabbling over officials.

22 U. S. CREWS COMING TO CANADIAN HENLEY
Philadelphia, July 13.—Twenty-two crews, representing most of the leading rowing clubs in Philadelphia, will compete in the annual Henley Canadian Regatta at St. Catharines, July 30 to August 1. In addition, W. E. Garrett-Gilmore, United States sculling champion, and Paul Costello will try for the Canadian title. The Penn. C. will have the largest representation of any single club. Its entries include a senior eight oared crew, the United States champion four-oared shell (Heferman, Hergen, Johnson and Jack Doyle), senior double sculls crew of McNicholas and Morehead; McIlvaine and Finnegan in the quarter mile dimes and Johnson and Beckett, 140 pound single scullers.

Other local clubs that have entered crews or individual oarsmen in the various events are the Bachelors, Malta, Pennsylvania Barge, Vesper and Undine.

Saturday's results in the East Toronto League lightened up the race still closer.
