Dempsey-Tunney Bout May Be Held in N.Y. After All

New York, July 27.—Tex Rickard and his heavyweight title fight have been invited to return to New York with every prospect that the bout will be held in the Yankee stadium September 6. George Brower, chairman of the New York State Commission last year, who has stood by the present head of the board, James A. Farley in the argument that Harry Wills, negro, should have the fight, had a change of heart, invited Rickard to return, and Tex, balked at least temporarily. Brower's invitation can mean only one thing in the opinion of close students of the situation here, and that is that Rickard will receive a 2 to 1 vote of confidence when he again places the question of a Dempsey-Tunney bout before the commission. His attorneys, Rickard says, have assured him that B. C. Clements, who claims binding contracts with Dempsey, and Wills "hasn't a leg to stand on." But Clements' opposition, he added, had been just another factor in the battle with the "Babe" Ruth will begin planning the fight back soon.

Garry Vance was the victim but looked like a winner in the ninth when his mates sent one run across and he had two other on base. Vance had a hit twice saved the game for the Pirates with running catches. In the only American league contest Philadelphia defeated Boston 5 to 0. Eddie Hommel allowing only four hits. Two runs scored on Jim Poole's home run smash in the eighth.

He should make this year his best and will be Don's entry in the special 16-lb. and association singles.
