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INCENDIARY FIRES IN CITY SCHOOLS LEAD TO INQUIRY

Four Suspicious Blazes Reported in Three Weeks—One Traced Down

End Kuomintang Rule Demand of Shanghai Movement to Oust Government Grows, Complicating Peace Negotiations

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Mr. Justice Orde to-day declared the marriage between Herman Hilton Thompson and Zillah Eveleen Crawford, married one Andrew Gordon Eveleen Thompson, in Buffalo, N.Y. His lordship points out that it is not suggested Crawford in no way appeared in person or in Nevada at any time during the course of his wife's action there.

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INSISTS THAT GERMANY SHOULD HAVE A VOICE IN DANUBIAN SCHEMES

MacDonald Interfered With Plans Arranged Between Simon and Tardieu SITUATION MIXED UP

By HENRY SOMERVILLE Special Cable by The Star's Resident London Correspondent. Copyright London, March 30.—Andre Tardieu limited himself to London to confer with Raymond MacDonald. He announced that the two premiers will talk about reparations as well as the Danubian question, from which observers infer that France will use reparations arguments to secure British co-operation regarding Danubian schemes.

Many French papers and two London papers say that Sir John Simon and Premier Tardieu had actually reached an agreement about Danubian procedure and that MacDonald interfered with insistence that Germany should have a voice in the discussion.

Germany and Italy are as much interested as Britain and France in Danubian schemes for the benefit of customs union or preferential tariffs between Danubian countries. Premier Tardieu could not openly object to Germany and Italy being consulted, but he fears that Germany will try to prevent a Danubian trading union unless she is a member of it.

There is some unreality about these discussions between the great powers since Danubian agreement, since Danubian countries have never

shown ability to agree amongst themselves. They can only be induced to lower their tariffs as the price of more credit to be received from other countries.

The situation is extraordinarily complicated, and there is not much prospect of the Tardieu visit or subsequent four-power conference straightening it out.
