

# Lord Nelson Chapter Studies Leadership League With Blair Laing as Tutor

### With I.O.D.E., League Aims to Uphold British Traditions and Canada's Place in Commonwealth

Mr. Blair Laing was speaker for the Leadership League before a special gathering of the Lord Nelson Chapter, I.O.D.E., at the Grand Club yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Leonard Blackburn presided, and introduced Mr. Laing.

Mr. Laing explained that the Leadership League, in common with the I.O.D.E., aims to maintain British traditions and to assure Canada's future in the British Commonwealth of Nations. He urged the women of the chapter to use their franchise and assert their right to govern; to demand freedom of speech, and common action.

Small groups should be formed, he added, for discussion of national problems; and these groups would expand eventually, and would be enabled to send concrete suggestions to the government.

Mr. Laing explained the extent of unemployment, and outlined what Rev. John Frank had done in helping to minimize it.

The members were all keenly interested, and many asked questions of the speaker.

Mrs. Blackburn also introduced Mrs. James Ince, past president of the National Chapter, who spoke briefly. The vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. T. Wilbur Best, and seconded by Mrs. Norman Young. At the tea hour Mrs. Ince and Mrs. Irving Hall, honorary regent, presided.

## INTELLIGENCE NEEDED

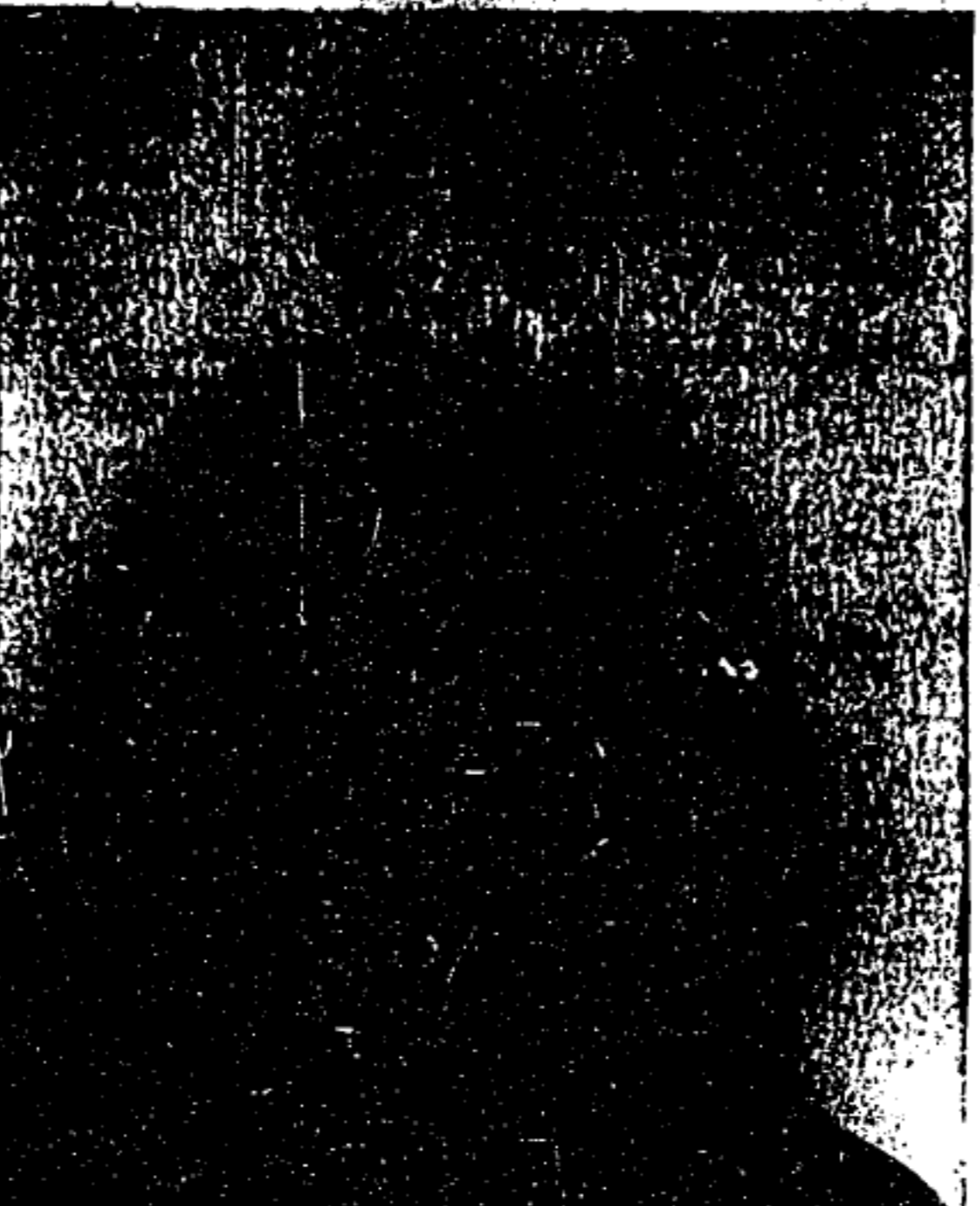

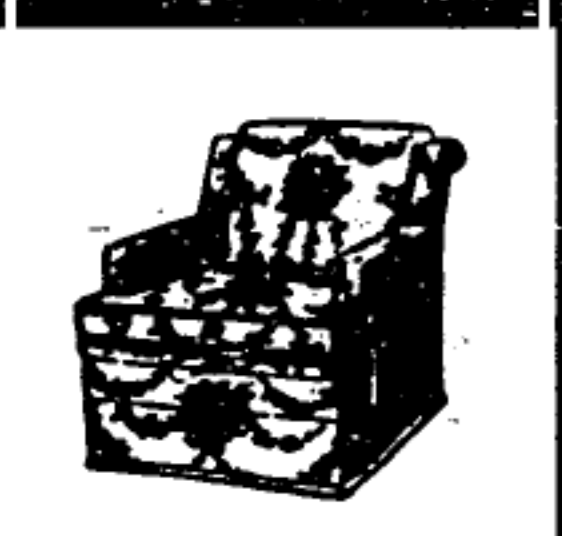
# Twenty-first Legislature May Be Coming of Age For Quebec Women

Montreal, April 17 (CP)—Quebec women have the assurance of Right Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Federal Minister of Justice, that suffrage will be permitted in this province as soon as the Liberal Party returns to power.

Addressing members of the Sir

Whitby Laurier Women's Club Saturday night, Mr. Lapointe said: "Women will soon have the right to vote in this province; as soon as the Liberal Party is in power in Quebec. In all countries, in times of crises, it is the women who have dictated to men the course of their conduct."

"Let us hope that the time will come when all their rights will be recognized in this province as they are in other provinces of this country."

WE DO NOT suppose that any of our readers have an idea of going to the United States and becoming criminals; but if they should we urge them strongly to violate state rather than federal laws. The latter cannot be broken with greater impunity than laws in Canada or England. All of us have heard a great deal about American lawlessness, the corrupt link between politics and crime, the terrific murder record and other alarming stories which might have the tendency of making the ignorant believe that all one needed in the United States to defy any law was a little money and a political friend.

Usque Bonum Is Tough.

Whatever may be true of the administration of some state laws and the corruption in some cities it is not true that federal law can be trifled with. We note that Al Capone, after defying the whole law enforcement system of the state of Illinois for years, committing or ordering perhaps scores of murders, was laid by the heels because he cheated on his federal income tax returns, and is now serving a sentence in Alcatraz. The other day Johnny Torrio, almost his equal as a criminal, went to prison for income tax irregularities, though his murders remain unpunished.

**Fashionable Smuggler.**

The wife of a Judge of the New York Supreme Court similarly takes a jail sentence for smuggling. One can imagine the possibility of very strong influence being brought to bear on her behalf. But it failed to save her from a punitive fine for smuggling a couple of years ago, and now it fails to keep her out of jail. So, as we say, we do not advise readers to go to the United States to commit crimes. But we cannot advise them to remain here to commit them either, and have really nothing to offer than the platitudes against wrong conduct anywhere.
