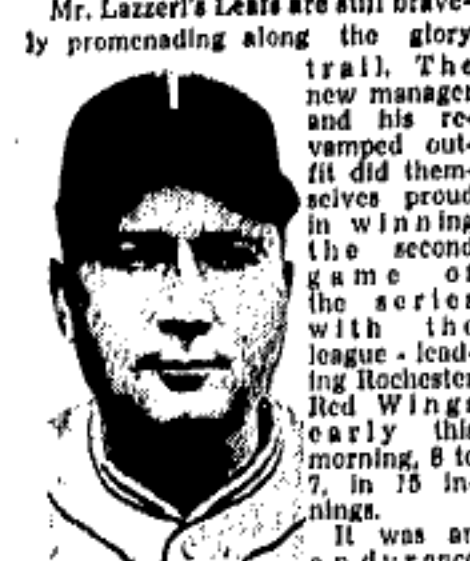


LEAFS OUTFINISH RED WINGS IN TORRID ENDURANCE TILT
