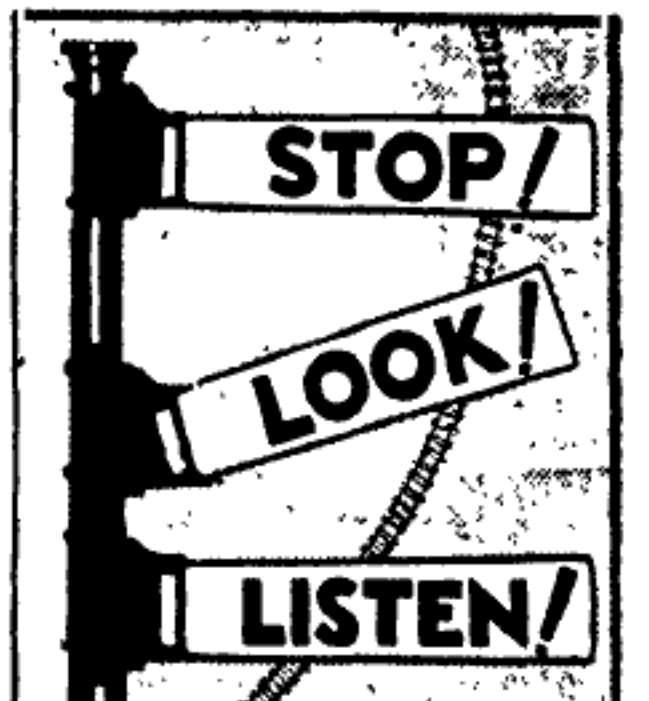
LY.R.A. BOOSTS MEMBERSHIP FEE ELECT OFFICERS
