World Discus Mark, 4:03.7 Santee Mile In U.S. Nationals

Lincoln, Neb., June 21 (CP).—Sim Iness of University of Southern California bettered the world record for the discus throw and Wes Santee of Kansas ran the mile in 4:03.7 at the 22nd annual U.S. National collegiate track and field meet here Saturday.
Iness tossed the discus 190 feet, 7/8 inches—four feet 13/8 inches further than the accepted world mark of 185 feet, 11 inches set by Fortune Gordien of University of Minnesota at a meet in Finland in 1949.
Santee's mile was the second fastest ever run by an American. He won the Saturday mile by 25 yards over Fred Dwyer of Villanova.
Rich Ferguson of Toronto, who races for University of Iowa, won the two-mile run in 9:02.7.

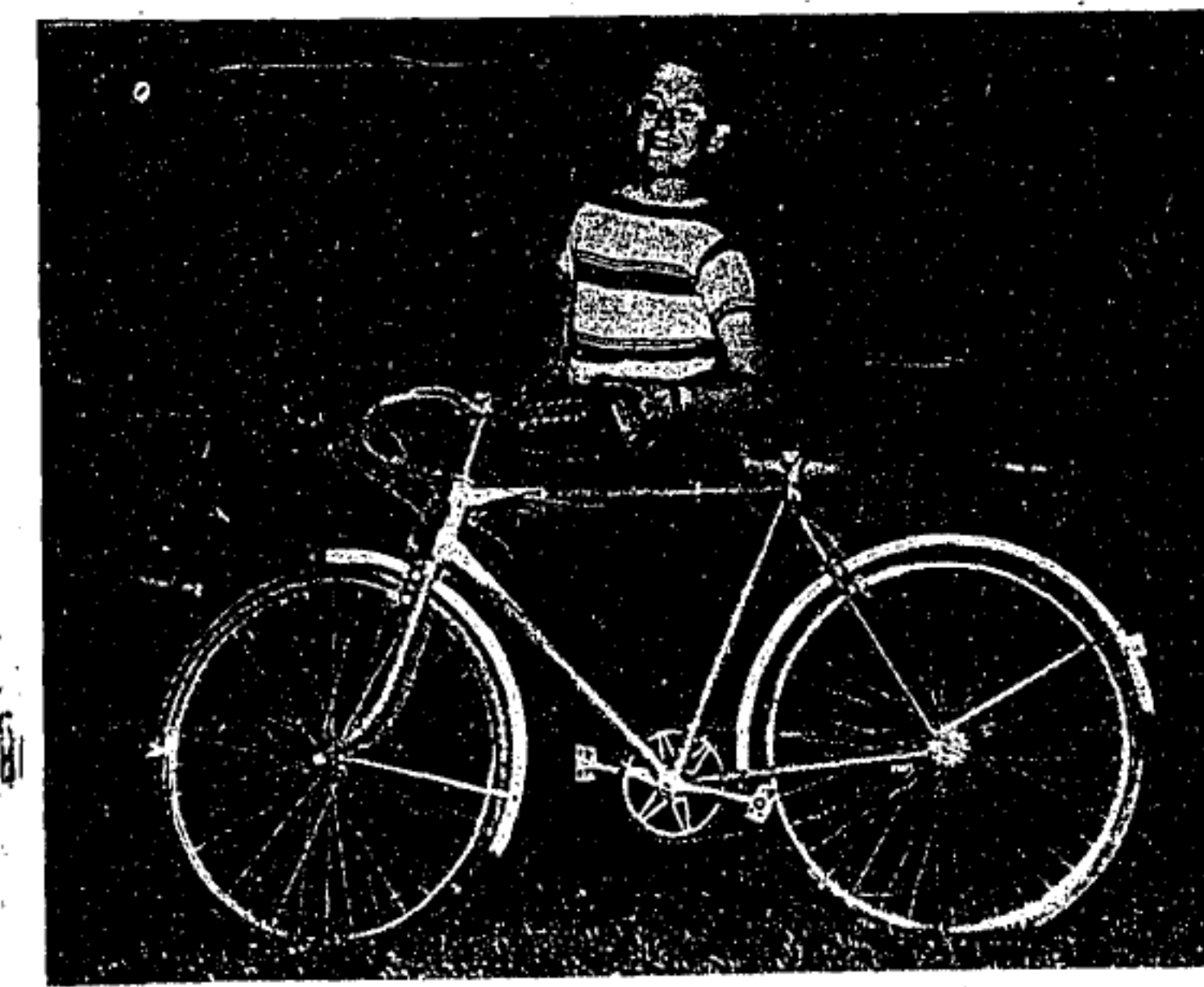
