## BEASLEY HORSE ROMPS TO THE GOLDEN SPOON CUP AND SAUCER NEXT

 How are they going to beat Bill Beasley's Canadian Champ next Saturday's Cup and Saucer? They're not sure some might win by a quarter pole and ping him right between the eyes as he turns out of the backstretch, but that will be the only way to whip him.

The Champ had a lot of a hard race in the \$5,000 added Golden Spoon, what with Beau George cutting throats with him for a quarter of a mile and then Gracefield taking dead aim on him from there but he pulled away from the latter to win by a length in a snappy 1:18.2-5 for the 8 1/2 furlongs. Beau George was third, but ten lengths back, five up on Billy Briar. Fort Whyte and Lord Elgin brought up the rear. And we mean rear.

However, he won't have to press his superiority over this field Dave Stevenson still had to whack him right sharply in spots to shake off Gracefield, and was still riding him out on the home.

However, he won't have to be tought to beat in the Cup and Saucer. The Queen's Plate? Ah, that's a long way off and something else again. The Champ, by the way, paid \$2.30 smallest payoff on the race.

There was another test match on the card, the Markham Centennial, a mile and one-sixteenth affair wherein a few characters eyeing the \$40,000 added Canadian Championship race were trying on the track for size.

That worked out as expected when the Kennedy-Veale combo's Marked Game, at 3 to 4, rolled home by four over the field.

Beau George, with Little Wolf and Moon Jet in a dead heat for show only half a length further in arrears. But it will help them all nothing.

Risque House forced Little Wolf's race with Alingo Gomez chucking with Marked Game in third place. When Gomez moved on the turn it was over. Risque House was shuffled back some turning right at the far end of the place. A fine effort for this escapee from the stud ranks. However in the Championship they have to contend with a lot of top class second-smashing Hickory Hill for one.

For two, who knows? Hasty House Farms' threatens to send up Sea O Erin, and that latter won the \$54,700 Bixby and Hawk total earnings to \$161,567. Kenzie Church rode Sea O Erin. Hirsch Jacobs claims he'll send Paper Tiger up for the race. Paper Tiger has been only one head by Traffic Judge in the \$50,000 added Woodward Handicap at Belmont Saturday. Pat Devereaux has advised he'll ship the greatest handicapper at Detroit, the Champ Alo Gaylor for the Wild Mink thing on Thanksgiving Day.

P. Taylor's Navy Page, 3 to 5, took winners of the fourth start of a string of three odds-on winners. . . .

Adding standbys—Frankie Merrill saddled two winners, Propeller in the seventh and Clarlicht in the last, both favorites. . . .

## Elderly Max Evans in Golf Upset

Huntington, N.Y., Oct. 3—(AP)—Max Evans of Utica, Mich., yesterday captured the \$15,000 Long Island Rotary Open golf championship over the par-70 Huntington Crescent Club course of 6,550 yards with a 72-hole total of 284.

The 36-year-old Evans, one of the oldest players in the field of 120, fired a 67 in the final round to win the prize of \$2,400.

## HORSE VAN DRIVERS REFUSE TO CROSS TRACK PICKET LINE

Boston, Oct. 3—(AP)—Today's opening program at Suffolk Downs was cancelled because of labor trouble.

The first race of the nine-evening card had been scheduled for 12:45 p.m. EST.

The track management issued this brief statement: "Owing to pickets surrounding Suffolk Downs, and the impossibility of installing the totalizer machine in time to open today at 12:45 p.m., today's racing card must be cancelled."

Later, a track official expressed hope the track would open tomorrow when today's card would be run.

Meanwhile, management petitioned in Suffolk superior court for an injunction to prevent the pickets from interfering with passage of trucks.

Drivers of horse vans and trucks containing needed parimutuel equipment refused to cross the lines set up by the Building Service Employees' union (AFL).

A management spokesman said the union presented no demands at a meeting arranged yesterday by State Labor Commissioner Ernest Johnson.

Management also asserted it has a contract with the unaffiliated Mutual Clerks' Guild of Massachusetts.

The Guild issued a statement asserting it has a contract through 1956 with the track and that its 350 members are satisfied with the arrangement. The track has about 800 employees.

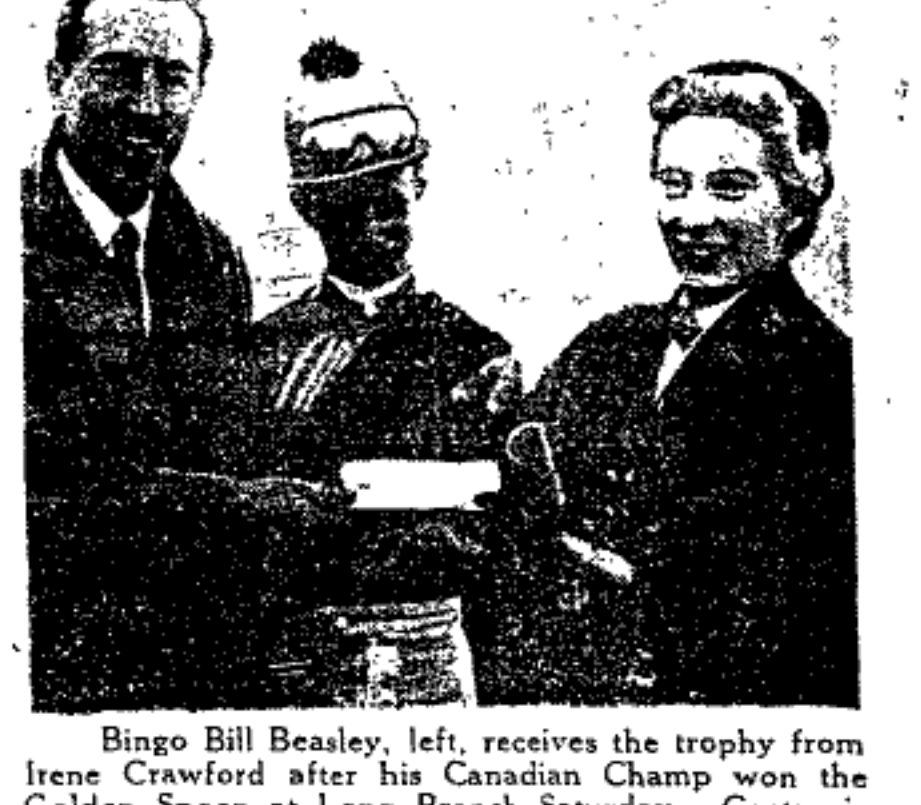
