Round of Eight Proves Graveyard For U.S. Net Hopes

Wimbledon, Eng., July 1 (UPI)—The United States was shut out of the Wimbledon men's singles semi-finals for the first time in 32 years when Vic Seixas and Herb Flam were beaten today, leaving defending champion Lew Hoad to battle it out for the title with two fellow-Australians and a Swede.

Think Hoad Is Not Ready To Turn Pro
