Braves Pick On Favorite Cousins Hike Lead Over Bucs

It looks as if the Milwaukee Braves are out to win the 1958 National League pennant the same way they won the 1957 flag — by stomping all over the Cincinnati Redlegs.

And even the streaking, miracle-hopping Pittsburgh Pirates won't be able to do much about it if the Braves keep knocking off the Redlegs at the .800-pace that they've been doing for the last two years.

The Braves, rocked by two straight losses in Pittsburgh, returned to the winning track last night when they picked on their favorite "cousins" for 9-2 and 4-2 victories. The sweep built the Braves' lead back to 5 1/2 games despite the fact the Philadelphia Phillies, 10-9, and the third-place San Francisco Giants drubbed the St. Louis Cardinals, 11-2.

The Braves ripped the Redlegs apart, 18-4, last season and have a 10-3 edge this year making a two-year domination of 28-7 for .800.

Juan Pizarro pitched a seven-incher in the first game for the Braves and Lew Burdette came through with a six-hitter in the nightcap. The Braves' long-ball sluggers were at work as usual

against Cincinnati pitchers. Joe Adcock blasting a three-run first-inning homer in the opener and Ed Mathews and Andy Pafko homering in the nightcap.

The victory was Pizarro's third since he returned a month ago from Wichita and Burdette's 12th, compared to nine losses for the season. The Redlegs have lost nine of their last 11 games.

Roberto Clemente and Bill Mazeroski drove in seven runs between them as the Pirates stretched their win-

ning streak to seven games — longest for the club in nine years. Clemente knocked in four runs with homers in his first two at-bats and Mazeroski, batting 150 over the last seven games, drove in three with a homer and a single.

Three-run homers by Willie Mays and Valmy Thomas were the big blows for the Giants who routed Vinegar Bend Mizell with a four-run fifth-inning and "lived it up" with five more runs in the eighth. Ruben Gomez yielded

eight hits as he cruised to his seventh win behind the Giants' 13-hit attack.

The Los Angeles Dodgers beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-5, in the other National League game when pinch-hitter Elmer Valo doubled home Don Zimmer in the ninth. The victory lifted the Dodgers out of last place into seventh place — a fitting present for Walt Alston who learned earlier in the day that he is going to be rehired as manager next season.

In the American league,

the Washington Senators extended their fourth loss in five games. Roy Sievers hit his 33rd homer for the Senators to tie him for the A.L. lead with the Yankees' Mickey Mantle. Truman Cleverger received credit for the win in relief.

Paul Foytack won the opener for the Tigers with the help of a five-run fifth-inning rally and rookie Herb Moford gained his third win in the nightcap on Gail Harris' two-run fourth-inning homer. The sweep extended the Tigers' winning streak to five games and overshadowed a fine relief appearance by Cleveland outfielder Rocky Colavito who pitched three hitless innings in a futile effort to save the second game.
